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The Florida Department of Education states that the graduation rate among black youth is 68% that is lower than Hispanics at 76.7% and Whites at 82.8% as of 2015. Specifically, the Black male graduation rate from that same group is a staggering 62.9%. Black students in Broward are just 28.5% of Florida's youth population but makeup 74% of arrest according to the New Times. The good news is that Broward did have a 51% drop in school arrest. Education and exposing our youth to positive role models would have a positive impact in avoiding incarceration. In today's era many students come from one-parent households or have two parents that work, or are born to teen mothers, so in most cases, the parent either don't take the time or are not aware of the importance of nurturing the child into adult hood. Often the term "no home training" is used to describe students that have not been taught proper social etiquette. Many students become latchkey kids and when left alone, get into all kinds of trouble. Our program takes a holistic, pro-active approach by providing a structured program of supervised activities with emphasis on social skills, leadership development, financial literacy, and career development. We will surround students with positive role models who may have gone through difficult situations; but through their struggles became successful. Our program will keep kids off the street during the times that they

Instructors are hired on a contractual basis and will be paired with volunteers to insure more classroom control and management.

B. Supplies

Each student will receive a notebook including pens, markers, ruler paper, typing paper calendar, dividers, scissors and pen pouch. Students will be required to maintain a journal while participating in the program and come prepared for all assignments. Student will be required to maintain and wear their T-shirts during four planned field trips to identify them as visitors.

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

Statistically, a lot of crime is committed because juveniles don't have any structure and positivity in their lives; live in poverty and have nowhere to exert stress and/or peer pressure which has been bestowed upon them because of circumstances and living conditions. Diverting at risk youth from the everyday stresses, criminal justice system and promoting academics, as well as mentoring programs, is first and foremost for the envisioned programs at SOARS RESET, INC. which is also aligned with the Sheriff's Priority Area. We believe that all students deserve a second chance if they have gotten into trouble and an intervention program designed to keep others from ever getting into brushes with the law. High priority is getting students who are contemplating quitting school to stay in school and those who have dropped out to get a high school diploma and enroll in vocational/technical school if college is not their choice. Successful completion of technical classes could be rewarded with gainful employment and an upgrade in economic/financial status. We at SOARS RESET believe that a man who will not work will engage in criminal activity. Our goal is to instill educational programs to get youth to stay in school and become successful, law abiding, taxpaying citizens which in turn will make our neighborhoods safe because statistics show that when the youth are working, fewer crimes are committed. (Source: National Reentry Resource Center). We will also assist with sealing and expunging records and our long term goals include getting students interested in legal research.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

SOARS RESET, INC.

This program is needed because so many at risk youth are finding themselves involved with the Department of Juvenile Justice and in some cases, facing possible incarceration. Geographically, at risk youth living in the lower income, crime ridden areas of our neighborhoods need positive influence and structure in order to thrive. Statistically, youthful offenders who participate and successfully complete programs of our caliber are less likely to commit crimes. In Broward County last year, there were 2,858 first-time juvenile offenders, with a criminal record, dealing with the Department of Juvenile Justice and the local criminal court system. (Source: Civil Citation Program for Juveniles/Broward County Human Services Department). Implementing the Civil Citation Program, along with the deterrent program which we institute for at risk/disadvantaged youth, will significantly impact the amount of youth committing crimes. We feel that supplying juveniles with positive decision making techniques will also help deter crime. Being surrounded by positive people in a positive environment with positive mannerism and behavior results in positive actions.

SOARS RESET, INC. is an organization where at risk students can come, express themselves, participate in age appropriate activities, get tutoring, be motivated by mentors, entrepreneurs and upstanding citizens of the community. In some cases, these at risk students feel as if they have no "real" reason to not get into trouble. There are repeat cycles which must be broken and at risk students and youthful offenders must realize that they are worthy of being given the opportunity to succeed. Given all the right components, success is inevitable. The population which we are serving are students who are at risk of quitting school, those who are out of school with no real structure in life and those who are willing to do the work to become successful. The age category is from 14 to 23 years of age. Instituting our program will help reduce recidivism and embellish the morals and values into the lives of these at risk youth.

Presently, we have partnered with Joseph C. Carter Park where we hold mentoring sessions for area students. We anticipate 50 students/juveniles to a maximum of 100 by year 2018.

SOARS RESET, INC. is a new program; however, we are actively involved in community activities which will pave the way for what we are attempting to accomplish and make our name synonymous with success. We helped feed over 100 individuals, homeless and families during Thanksgiving; mentored several students at the Joseph C. Carter Parks and Recreation Center and provided families in need with small stipends for food as well as referrals for clothing (i.e. school uniforms). Getting the support and trust of the community will also help us to achieve our goal of helping the youth in the community.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

We propose the following:

We anticipate enrolling 50 participants from the predominantly low income, economically challenged areas of the

County. There will be three (3) session programs (one session in July; two in August). We shall:

1) Accommodate 50 at risk youth between the ages of 14 and 23 years of age. They shall be provided with refreshments which include:

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1 banana x .42 each x 50 students = $21.00 per day x 3 days =$63.00

Graham crackers = 300 pkgs. per case from Restaurant Depot @ $32.00/case x 3 days = $32.00

Water = 50 students x 2 waters per day x 3 sessions = 300 bottles = $200.00

Chips = 120 per case @ $56.00 x 2 sessions = $112.00 (Restaurant Depot)
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\$407.00

The program runs from 9:00 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Students without transportation will be picked up and returned home by the Director, Dexter Gunn. Upon arriving at the site, students will be introduced, treated to refreshments and the resource notebooks will be distributed to each participant. Hand sanitizers are provided for the students for their use as well as Lysol wipes to wipe down any dirty surfaces and clean up after themselves.

Composition materials along with pen, paper and three ring binders containing resource guides and other pertinent information pertaining to our organization and the services we provide will be given to the student. Our mission statement, contact information and other helpful data is included in the book.

Staff and volunteers will attempt to keep the students entertained and engaged in meaningful dialogue which will help them to reach their fullest potential. Real life scenarios and stories will be discussed and disseminated in demonstrations and students are expected to give their feedback and participate as much as they seem comfortable doing. We will explain the pros of working hard, building credit and being a productive citizen, as opposed to living a life of crime which leads to incarceration and death.

Additionally, there will be two (2) laptop computers available for the students to do Google searches or cross reference checks on topics discussed each session. We will show the participants the data on young males around the country who are serving harsh sentences at a young age, in hopes that it will deter them away from the system. We at SOARS RESET understand that many of our youth today just need to know that someone cares about them, so we don't have a problem showing them love. To assure that no time is wasted during our sessions. We also have a certified IT person readily available to assist if needed to upload PowerPoint programs as well as with any technical problems, viruses, etc.

SOARS RESET, INC. will acquire liability insurance for the duration of these program sessions. Storage space will be used for donations for a fundraiser at the conclusion of this program. Our fundraiser will include a yard sale and a flower sale to give the participants an example of what it will be like to be a business owner. Several guest speakers will come out and present a portion of their life stories in addition to educational advice. The participants will also be introduced to several representatives from local vocational and college programs. With the help of this grant, SOARS RESET has the potential to be the most successful program in Broward County's history to reduce crime and increase employment among the youth.



In October, 1995 the first residence of the Susan B. Anthony Recovery Center (SBA) opened as a six-room house, serving five women and their six children. The comprehensive and compassionate treatment program for substance abuse, mental health disorders and /or homelessness for pregnant or parenting women and their children was a vision of the Junior League of Fort Lauderdale that first came into being through a research project focusing on women and alcoholism. Today, SBA, named for Susan B. Anthony, a recovering alcoholic and founding member of the Junior League, is a full service residential treatment center, providing expert care, diagnosis and treatment of alcohol and drug addiction as well as therapeutic and development services to women and their children.

For over 21 years, SBA is still the only facility of its kind in Broward County successfully serving the full-service transitional needs of this very special population. Since its inception the center has helped bring over 1400 families back together and provided the intensive services needed to stop the cycle of family dysfunction and substance addiction among the twelve hundred children served. SBA addresses the special issues that women face while in recovery from the disease of substance addiction while keeping the family intact.

SBA is licensed by the State of Florida Department of Children and Families in accordance with Chapter 397, Florida Statutes to provide substance abuse services for Adults for the following components: Residential Level 2,

Residential Level 5, Outpatient Treatment, Aftercare, Intensive Outpatient Treatment; therapeutic treatment programs range from including peer mentoring, and are individually planned through all of the stages. Always focused on long term development and support for recovery, SBA teaches the specific transitional skills necessary for successful re-entry into the community. SBA provides training and certification for employment in a wide array of trades and offers job coaching and placement services as well. Anthony Recovery Center (SBA) is a full service drug treatment/ drug prevention residential treatment center, providing expert care, diagnosis and treatment of alcohol and drug addiction as well as therapeutic and development services to women and their children. SBA addresses the special issues that women face while in recovery from the disease of substance addiction while keeping the family intact. The SBA Re-Entry Success through Education & Technology Program (RESET) will continue to meet a pressing need in Broward County to expand and enhance residential treatment for substance addicted mothers with children to include career & education training, drug prevention and crime prevention as a component of successful re-entry into the community and long term recovery for those mothers, and the end to the cycle of addiction for the affected families.

The SBA RESET Program meets the LETF category requirements because this program usage is to empower women with children recovering in residential treatment to attain self-sufficiency, wellness, and the realization of their ultimate potential by building skills through the effective use of current technologies, providing educational and training support and role modeling professional behavior. The program will provide technical skills and training to a minimum of 150 women annually who struggle with histories of homelessness and limited work histories, criminal records, substance use disorders and other (co-occurring mental health conditions) mental health concerns with the intent of creating a higher likelihood of these women maintaining employment at a living wage, a key component of sustaining long term recovery, and preserving a healthy environment for their children and stopping the cycle of addiction. Giving particular attention to ensuring clients have adequate technology skills to compete in today's workplace, the combination of quality in-house classes, workshops, and counseling, with strong community partnerships and connections, creates an effective bridge for participants to achieve their goals. Having the continuation of this program aides the current state recidivism and relapse rates by helping to create safe communities for Broward and neighboring counties.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

The SBA Re-Entry Success through Education & Technology Program (RESET) will meet a pressing need in Broward County to expand and enhance residential treatment for substance addicted mothers with children to include career & education training as a component of successful re-entry into the community and long term recovery for those mothers, and the end to the cycle of addiction for the affected families. In Broward County every year, several hundred children enter the child welfare system due to abuse, abandonment or neglect. (ChildNet) Many of those children are placed as the result of intervention by the child welfare or criminal justice system when their mother have been identified as unable to care for them as a result of her drug or alcohol addiction.

As drug dependency and poverty increase in Broward County, the need for a long term solution becomes more critical. According to the Florida Drug Enforcement Administration, Broward is a primary area for drug trafficking, drug use, and the epicenter of prescription drug distribution and use. Poverty also impacts many families in Broward County where the cost of living is the third highest in Florida. The U.S. Census American FactFinder (2014) indicates that 30.8% of Broward families with related children less than 18 years live in poverty. The economic recession disproportionately impacted Florida. In May 2012, there were 3,249 Broward families receiving Temporary Assistance to Needy Families with over 20,000 applications; 226,001 were Medicaid clients; and 154,411 households received food stamps (FL DCF, Circuit 17).

The SBA Career & education Department (Career & Education) has been successfully serving woman who are pregnant or have young children, who are recovering from the detrimental effects of substance abuse and mental illness, including homelessness and criminal activity, by providing educational support and training as part of comprehensive treatment plan since 1995. Empowered mothers who maintain employment at a living wage have a higher likelihood of sustaining long term recovery, creating a healthy environment for their children and stopping the cycle of addiction.

As a result of their addiction, the majority of women served at SBA have poor educational backgrounds, limited marketable skills, and little to no work history. These families are typically low income status with few financial resources and need to develop educational, vocational, and employment skills in order to become self-sufficient. Without additional training specifically tailored to meet their mental health and legal issues, their lack of proper education and skills will continue to inhibit their ability to compete for the few employment opportunities available as they attempt to re-enter the community following successful completion of their substance abuse treatment.

From July 1, 2015 and June 30, 2016, the Career & Education department solidified twenty three (23) corporate partnerships through community outreach for the purposes of offering employment and/or OJT training opportunities to SBA clients. As of this writing, out of 150 persons being served annually; presently ninety-three (93) women are

employed with one of SBA community partners. One hundred and forty three (143) received Job Skills training and support. Most importantly, as a result of this training, 3 months after re-entry into the community, 66 women (70%) were still employed at the position where they were placed with SBA assistance, and successfully maintaining their households.

General Education Development (GED) Test Preparation and successful completion is the first step in the success ladder for most SBA residents and is often a minimum requirement for job placement. Changes have been made in the GED test preparation process and the software required. These changes make it necessary for test preparation/administration providers to have the most current technology (both hardware and software) to effectively administer the required program and preparation. SBA's current computer stations have become inadequate. They do not meet these minimum standards, which puts this vital step in the re-entry success system in jeopardy. Additionally, the 15 stations are not sufficient to provide the total population with training in an expeditious manner, creating a waiting list of woman anxious to prep and test for the GED. The Career & Education team has identified the need for new computers as essential to the ongoing success of the program.

The overall focus of the Career & Education Department is to create programs that enable the women served at SBA to find and maintain a living wage job - currently \$11.84 per hour - that will adequately support their entire family and allow them to become productive members of the community. Finding meaningful employment is a critical step on the path to recovery because it gives these women structure and purpose while building self-esteem through success.

Who/What:

The SBA RESET Program meets the LETF category requirements because this program usage is to empower women with children recovering in substance abuse & drug prevention residential treatment to attain self-sufficiency, wellness, and the realization of their ultimate potential by building skills through the effective use of current technologies, providing educational and training support and role modeling professional behavior. Having begun the second quarter of 2014, the program has provided technical skills and training to over a 150 women annually that struggle with histories of homelessness and limited work histories, criminal records, substance use disorders and other (co-occurring mental health conditions) mental health concerns with the intent of creating a higher likelihood of these women maintaining employment at a living wage, a key component of sustaining long term recovery, and preserving a healthy environment for their children and stopping the cycle of addiction. Giving particular attention to ensuring clients have adequate technology skills to compete in today's workplace, the combination of quality in-house classes, workshops, and counseling, with strong community partnerships and connections, creates an effective bridge for participants to achieve their goals. Having the continuation of this program aide's the local crime prevention and the current state recidivism & relapse rates by helping to create safe communities for Broward and neighboring counties.

The program will provide technical skills and training to a minimum of 150 Broward County mother's annually; who are receiving drug abuse treatment at SBA who have historically poor educational and employment histories. They will be provided education, technical skills and training with the intent of a higher likelihood of maintaining employment at a living wage. Many of the women served have been involved with the criminal justice system and are referred by the Department of Corrections (DOC).

Additionally, as the program evolves and additional funding is secured, SBA intends to leverage the investment in a new learning lab to enhance offerings to SBA outpatient clients, more than 1450 SBA alumni, and SBA's community partners. SBA has created a structured career & education institution that offers programs to encourage and assist clients to acquire a GED by providing GED classes at the treatment site. In this way, clients can feel that education and

GED classes are an important part of their treatment. Individual career & education plans are created for every residential client based on TABE (Test of Adult Basic Education) evaluations. Also, classes offered include a tutoring grid which allows clients unable to comprehend the lessons to have access to individual tutoring sessions with an expert of that particular subject.

In addition to the GED classes, the program includes in-depth Vocational Training by providing clients with job and skill training courses at the facility. These classes teach the clients to learn time management, problem solving, job search, data entry, basic computer application, to dress for success and many of the unwritten rules of employment. The program provides trained and experienced staff and instructors who facilitate skills-building groups and provide support with interviews and appointments, post-employment/post-enrollment into educational institutions, and continued aftercare after successful graduation. A new On- the – Job Training (OJT) program for the person served will offer employee training at SBA while he or she is their recovery before job placement; usually by a career specialist offering hands-on training often supported by formal classroom training. OJT will give the persons served the ability to acquire skills that can be transferred into future job opportunities during their job placement phase. This will offer greater success of sustainability and self-sufficiency helping to ensure and improve transitions back into the community. Aiding in the ultimate mission SBA to "transform families by providing help, hope, and healing for mothers and their children to live responsible drug-free lives."

With new staff certifications and hardware in place, the RESET Program is positioned to also offer certifications to persons served in the future for various technology courses. Even with adequate skills training, one of the major barriers SBA clients face is the fact that they may be an ex-offender. The program has adopted the following strategies to overcome these barriers with potential hiring employers:

- Educate employers. SBA Job Coaches implement educational knowledge for employer groups to help them understand some of the positive aspects of hiring ex-offenders
- Help clients to evaluate work environments. SBA Job Coaches support ex-offenders to assess whether
 particular jobs and job offers provide a supportive environment for recovery from substance abuse disorders.
- Provide job coaching on an employer's site. SBA Job Coaches so provide support to assist new employees in adapting to a new work culture.

The department also provides referrals to community partners such as Vocational Rehabilitation and Career Source Broward, agencies that help establish funding for SBA residents to go back to school or attend vocational educational programs.

On-site child care services are also available for all residents of the center, removing that barrier to employment as well.

Where: SBA provides a warm and caring environment for women and their children to recover from the ill effects of the disease of addiction at a 64 bed residential treatment facility at 1633 Poinciana Drive, Pembroke Pines, FL, 33025, at the Howard C. Forman campus. The three buildings which make up SBA sit on a five-acre parcel. Women and their children may remain in the residential component for a maximum of 18 months, where in additional to the RESET Program training, they receive comprehensive individualized case management including 24

hour supervision & support, transportation services, 12 step meetings, spiritual groups, wellness classes, trauma, art and play therapy, family bonding activities and other career & education support.

When: The RESET Program will continue as an integral part of the services provided through SBA, year to year, It began during the 2nd quarter of 2014 and currently continues to service persons served on a daily basis. All residents have access to the trainings provided through RESET. The average length of stay for a resident at SBA is 6 months. Aftercare services, which also includes RESET programming, may be maintained for up to three years post-discharge to promote optimal recovery and rehabilitation. Currently, SBA's Aftercare program includes individualized case management, regular visits to their new residences, relapse prevention groups, career & education support and planned family activities. The RESET program goal is to aide in crime prevention, Drug abuse education and prevention; while integrating individuals back into the community to sustain drug free and prosperous lives.

In April 2014, SBA solidified a partnership with Sheridan Technical Institute (STI) that provided some the technology equipment requested, and the consultants to complete the upgrade. STI also provides the GED training. Since then STI has gone through budget cuts and we are no longer being supported with their consultants or group facilitators. The requested funding will support SBA in furthering the development of the SBA Re-Entry Success through Education & Technology Program (RESET) program. From inception, this program has supported high need clients (Absolute Priority 1) composed of adult women with substance abuse and mental health issues placed in SBA's residential facility by the Florida Department of Corrections (FDOC). According to data from the Florida Department of Corrections recidivism files; (i) inmates who earned a GED within 36 months of release recidivate at a rate 3.3% less than inmates overall, (ii) inmates who earned a Vocational Certificate within 36 months of release recidivate at a rate 13.8% less than inmates overall, and (iii) inmates with the most series drug problems who receive treatment within 36 months of release recidivate at a rate 5% less than the same type of inmate who did not receive treatment. (Florida Department of Corrections, 2015) Clearly, the importance of education is undeniable in diminishing the rate of recidivism. Women are particularly vulnerable to suffering from co-occurring conditions. Mental health, substance abuse and trauma issues strongly interfere with educability and employability, issues directly addressed at SBA. Women with poverty and substance use issues, accounting for virtually every resident at SBA, are over three times as likely to be unemployed (Marcus, 2014). Further, women consistently have more barriers to employment and yet are the primary caregiver for children in over 98% of cases where substance abuse is a parental issue.

Activities to be carried out in the enhanced RESET Program are part of a structured Career & Education institute offered to women in residential treatment at SBA beginning with GED preparation and testing at the treatment site, as well as other vocational and general skills training, with the option to encourage post-secondary education, career and occupational certifications. The SBA program includes other computer-lab based technical certification classes and general life and employment skills on topics such as time management, problem solving, job search, data entry, basic computer applications, dress for success and many of the unwritten rules of employment. Grant funding will be used to implement person served OJT (On-The- Job-Training) in the expanded RESET program. The OJT component provided by specialists will support educational gains, teaching the skills, knowledge, and competencies that are needed to perform specific jobs within the various workplaces and work environments to SBA clients. OJT will use existing SBA workplace tools, machines, documents, equipment, knowledge and skills necessary for clients to learn to effectively perform on their future jobs and careers. Some of the skills that will be offered within this curriculum based course are computer skills, gardening, housekeeping, administrative duties, data entry, customer service, event planning, maintenance, childcare, telecommunication, inventory clerk (Merchandising) and stocking.

The request of \$10,000 from BSO LETF will help secure Career and Education Specialist supplies, cover replacement equipment of the Learning Lab (9 Computer Work Stations), Diversified Computer Services (DSC) GED online prep-software, supplies and Information Technology (IT) Consulting directly associated with the RESET program. This will aide in the implementation of the new OJT component to project RESET.

Total Amount Requested from LETF: \$10,000.00.

The requested funding from BSO LETF will ensure optimal outcomes for proper placement in meaningful employment that will allow each woman to earn and keep her income and assets, while removing Barriers to aid in successfully increasing chances of breaking the cycle of drug abuse addiction. Benefiting our community by reducing relapse and recidivism rates, and offering assistance in the Broward County Crime Prevention and Drug Education for our community.

Has your agency received LETF Funding in the past 3 years? If yes, identify the source, \$ amount and type of program and performance data.

As previous recipients of \$10,000.00 from the LETF grant; we were able to continue to make strides in assisting and aiding women suffering from substance abuse and their families with re-entry services offering self-sufficiency and resiliency with the help of Broward's Sherriff Office. 76% seventy-six percent of the clients we served completed their GED, High School Diploma or Higher Education/ Vocational Certifications through SBA's current Project RESET Program between July 1, 2015 and June 30, 2016. Eighty-eight 88 women received Job Skills training and support. Most importantly, as a result of this training, 3 months after re-entry into the community, 52 women (71%) were still employed, and successfully maintaining their households. Beginning in 2014, revised GED requirements mandated that GED preparation and testing must be in an online format. The previous SBA computer lab hardware was not adequate to meet these new requirements. With the aid of the previous LETF funding and community partners SBA was able to increase the lab computer stations from 15 to 30 the SBA RESET Program meeting the new standards for GED preparation, while expanding its capacity allowing us to offer new updated courses to the entire SBA population in an expeditious manner.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

TRC proposes the TRUST program to deter the Youth from negative lifetime choices. In Central Broward County Florida, you can see the impact the lives of the youth is impacted by their parents having to work two or three jobs to support their families and still live below poverty levels. Project TRUST also diverts at-risk-youth from the criminal justice system. When educating the Youth and their parents in the TRUST program, it creates two opportunities. First the Youth will finish school and then can choose if they want to go to college or a trade school. Two, the parents can get training in the IT field and go for a better paying job , which will enable them to be more productive and able to supervise their children better. They can actually participate in their children's life and not just react to it when they have to get them out of jail or detainment. TRC's goal is to train the community in the field of IT. It is a thriving field and has many opportunities for the adults to better themselves and their families.

TRC staff consists of professionals that have worked in schools and are retired or semi-retired from fulltime work. Our administrative staff has accumulated over seventy years of managerial and organizational skills. TRC services are ongoing and multi-dimensional in that while providing youth with advanced life and technical skills, there is a need to care for their immediate family members. We need to expand case management support, to enable to help the entire family navigate through the system. TRC's administrators will coordinate with the staff with the training plans for the youth, the case workers will concentrate on the family as a whole. The instructors will teach the courses. TRC has a church that is giving us help in kind. The church is supplying a fifteen passenger van to pick up and drop off the students to TRC, including a driver. The classes will begin at the Former Lauderdale Manor School located at 1400 NW 14 Ct Fort Lauderdale, Fl. 33311. There will be three days a week. The classes will be taken in the computer lab. TRC will train about 20 youth and their families, approximately 60 in total. TRC will have two 20 week programs a year. TRC will use five evaluation tools to determine the program's effectiveness.

After surveying our client population of approximately 500 families we quickly realized 90% of them was impacted from food insecurity and resided in food desert areas, which was directly related to low academic performance in school and behavioral functioning in the community. To address the hunger issue (food insecurity) we developed a Health and Nutrition Program which provided low income families throughout Dade Broward and Palm Beach County fresh perishable and non-perishable foods on a weekly basis as well as educate the families on healthy lifestyles, good nutrition and basic food preparation techniques. With the Economic downpour beginning in 2008 the need expanded throughout the tri –county area thus requiring the program to travel to the communities in targeted areas to provide relief.

WHO: Every week the Food Distribution program consisting of a team of volunteers will partner with the Broward Sheriff Office, community agencies and various churches to provide healthy perishable and non-perishable food to over 5000 families residing in food desert areas, in efforts to enhance the health and wellbeing of children and families and address social issues associated with hunger and poverty.

Characteristics associated with these areas are insufficient income, vehicle availability and limited access to public transportation. Many of the families we provide services to are impoverished as identified by 100% of children receiving free or reduced lunch and classified 200% below the federal poverty level.

The Broward Sheriff Office and the Explorers has been in partnership with the Wayne Barton Study Center Food Distribution Program for over a year. This program provides a variety of mentoring opportunities that affords youth to interact with law enforcement. In addition to forging long-lasting positive relationships the

youth learn valuable crime prevention techniques.

WHAT: Communities that exist in food deserts or areas that do not have ready access to healthy, fresh food are often disadvantaged communities. These communities usually exhibit high rates of poverty, crime, and drug abuse. The residents of those communities have poor health and the children often exhibit behavior problems to include criminal activity as well as poor attendance and grades.

Due to the tremendous need in many of the communities, there is additional need for vehicles that can transport the donated goods to the distribution sites in a way that minimizes perishability and increases the likelihood that those items will arrive in a condition that is suitable for consumption.

We feel that the goal can be achieved by the addition of a refrigerated panel truck to the fleet currently serving the food distribution program. We recognize that this is not a complete solution but is a step towards meeting the needs of the at-risk communities we serve throughout Broward County.

When communities have greater access to affordable healthy foods the communities are safer, the overall health of the community improves, children tend to be more vibrant and healthier, to live, learn and play in their communities.

WHEN: Every Saturday from 9:00am -1:00pm the food distribution program will go to various neighborhoods throughout Broward County and provide food relief.

WHERE: To date the food distribution program has provided services to the residents of Deerfield Beach, Pompano Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Hallandale, Dania Beach, Sunrise, Lauderdale Lakes and Pembroke Park. The services we provide are not limited to the cities listed, however, serves as a basis to describe some of the areas who have benefitted from the program.



3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

According to the ALICE Report - Florida, 69% of all jobs pay less than \$20.00 an hour-with the majority of those jobs paying between \$10 and \$15 an hour (or, between \$20,000 and \$28,000 a year). This means that while nearly 1 in 3 people in Broward County work hard and live above the "Federal Poverty Level", they still often cannot afford the basics of housing, food, health care, child care, and transportation. One financial crisis, such as a car repair or medical bill, can overwhelm a family, leading to the loss of employment and financial ruin. Overlay services provided through this request compliment the array of services already provided by Children's Home Society of Florida. The services address families need for self-sufficiency and Sheriff Israel's priority area of assisting the homeless. The program accomplishes this by moving individuals from poverty to self-sufficiency, reducing social costs related to crime, poor health, and welfare, strengthening educational attainment and job skills, enhancing economic development, improving on the job productivity, revitalizing neighborhoods and building sustainable communities where everyone can live well.

The educational books and trainings will give the case managers a deeper understanding of their clients' challenges and strengths. They will then be able to create opportunities for success. The trainings provide an education on the hidden rules of class and teach fostering relationships across class lines in which members of all socio-economic classes work together to end poverty in Broward County.

CHS will provide individuals with the appropriate knowledge and skills to successfully transition from

homeless to self-sufficiency by identifying the individual's causes of poverty, the resources that are needed for healthy lifestyle choices, the stages of change, and resources available to help. This reduces unemployment and encourages productive civically engaged people. We empower individuals to make their own decisions regarding moving ahead in life toward financial stability and better nutrition and overall heath. Flex dollars are only given as a one-time use to cover an emergent need. Workbooks are provided to the clients to assist with their growth and development. By following our program guidelines individuals will find stable housing and no longer be homeless.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

In Broward County, 47% of families earn less than the basic cost of living. Our program utilizes the internationally recognized program "Bridges Out of Poverty" curriculum to assist our low-income residents who want to achieve self-sufficiency. Bridges Out of Poverty is a community-building process that provides a mechanism to draw together people from all corners of the community to address the problems of chronic poverty, short-term crisis thinking, and to develop the personal and community resources necessary for a healthy, productive community. It requires a different philosophy to tackle both the culture of poverty and to engage those struggling within it. Individuals experiencing low-income or poverty situations often are experiencing multiple areas of health, mental health and social problems at the same time. Our overlay services will utilize not only the best practice model of Bridges Out of Poverty, but also rely heavily on proven effective interventions in the fields of trauma, family engagement and empowerment, and mental health.

In Children's Home Society of Florida – Southwest Division the Bridges Out of Poverty Model reports successes: We served 144 families and over 300 children in improving their standard of living in fiscal year 2014. As the result of our program, *self-sufficiency* is accomplished by increasing attendance at school, improved grades and stable housing. Over 85% of our families served met these goals. Many of our parents are working, however they are unable to put down the necessary funds to move into permanent housing. Our program reduces roadblocks to *self-sufficiency* and as a result, 90% of our families moved into permanent housing and 33 families obtained long term job placement. This resulted in an increased rate of high school graduation and a reduction in unemployment due to stable housing, Children that are moved from school to school due to unstable or lack of permanent housing are often at *risk of delinquency*.

Program Components:

The Family Preservation Intervention Program (FPIP) serves families at risk for child abuse and neglect as well as families in crisis. The program served 450 individuals in fiscal year 2016. Families served must have their children residing in the household. The FPIP program provides the support and services necessary to create and maintain a safe, nurturing environment so that the family can remain together.

Approximately 80% of the referrals for this program are generated from Broward County Sheriff's Office, Child Protective Investigations Section. These referrals come to the attention of the Broward Sheriff's office as a result of allegations of abuse and neglect reported to the Florida Abuse Hotline.

FPIP incorporates three components. 1) Parent Education, 2) Cognitive Behavioral Theory, and 3) Intensive Case Management services. These are available to all families and delivered based upon need using the Nurturing Parent Curriculum

The purpose of this grant request is to add another dimension to the FPIP program. As noted above, in Broward County today, 69% of all jobs pay less than \$20.00 an hour with the majority of those jobs paying between \$10 and \$15 an hour (or, between \$20,000 and \$28,000 a year). To prevent that single car repair or a medical bill from overwhelming a family, leading to the loss of employment and financial ruin, we at CHS are proposing to add overlay services to the FPIP program. Families are given pre and post-tests using the Adult-Adolescent Parenting Inventory, North Carolina Family Functional Assessment Skill (standardized tests use to measure a clients progress) that target the families understanding of developmental milestones, parental stress, and parent perception of the child's behavior. This allows the clinical counselor to see which families make quantitative improvement through the post-tests. The use of the return demonstration model also provides the therapist an opportunity to watch the caregivers use the techniques taught throughout the intervention. The average intervention with a family is 12-16 weeks. The specific goals are included in the table below:

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

The proposed project addresses the LETF criteria as well as the sheriff's priority area by assisting youth in developing leadership skills, promoting academic success, engaging them in community projects, and preparing them for college and career readiness; all skills identified as priority. In order for youth to be well-rounded productive citizens, we have identified 12 modules that will guide youth. Through these modules the youth implement and use various skills. They participate in guided practice to apply what they have learned with a culminating real life experience consisting of a field trip. Upon successful completion of each module, youth will be able to assist in creating a safe neighborhood and utilize the leadership skills they've learned. The modules will also assist students to having academic and social success thereby increasing the high school graduation rate.

Various factors contribute to making youth successful students. According to available data, Broward County's high school graduation rate for the preceding school year averaged 77%. In addition, only 52% of students in Broward County were reading at grade level by 3rd grade.

In the 33309 and 33311 zip code the letter grades of the middle and high schools are C and D schools as rated by the Florida Department of Education.

On average, the schools are 89% economically disadvantaged. The middle schools are Title 1 schools and on average 84% of the students receive Free or Reduced Lunch (FRL). In addition, elementary schools had a high retention rate, thereby, creating over-age youth at the middle and high school level. Many schools in high poverty areas have students who possess the potential to achieve, but are performing below their potential.

Through our Youth Advisory Board and mentoring program students will be given the necessary tools to grapple with those barriers that may keep them from performing as well as their counterparts. Research indicates that students with a mentor are 52% less likely to skip a day of school and 37% less likely to skip a

class. In addition, mentoring benefits youth by: increasing high school graduation rates, lowering high school dropout rates, improving attitude about school, enhancing self-esteem and self-confidence, improving behavior, both at home and at school, and improving interpersonal skills. The same research indicated that, "Mentoring is often one component of a program that involves other elements, such as tutoring or life skills training and coaching."

In addition to the mentoring component, students will engage in like skills. Life skills components will enable youth to learn and practice these skills in order to help youth identify their goals and then accomplish them and live to their full potential. These components will consist of facilitated lessons, wherein an adult promotes discussion amongst the youth.

Finally, to ensure that students are ready for 21st century learning, through the Youth Advisory Board program, youth will be equipped with the Four C's. The 4C's consist of communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity and innovation. Through the group-mentoring model, youth will have many opportunities to work in a group setting wherein these skills can be practiced.

The program will address issues and concerns that the youth face such as bullying, teenage pregnancy, violence, drugs, and racism. In addition, only 52% of students in Broward County were reading at grade level by 3rd grade. The Youth Advisory Board and mentoring program addresses bullying, teen pregnancy, violence, drugs, and racism and the need to get youth reading at grade level. In addition the program helps with equipping youth with ownership of their learning and education.

This project has not been previously funded.

The program is aimed at creating a safe neighborhood and diverting youth from the criminal justice system. In addition, the program will address at risk youth in the areas of leadership development, academic and social success. It will also assist in increasing high school graduation rate. This program will address those students still reading below grade level as evidenced by FSA (Florida Standard Assessment) and also meet other criteria such as receiving FRL and live in the 33309 or 33311 zip code area. The Youth Advisory Board will be made up of 30 youth (girls and boys). Youth will come from middle and high school.

The requested funding will enable OKAY Institute to continue to offer its services to youth free of charge. The funding will cover salaries for two certified teachers, t-shirts for volunteers and staff, and purchase of books, copies and binding, field trips, lunch and snacks.

Initially, through leads from local schools, district database, and guidance and/or BRACE Counselors, OKAY Institute will solicit membership to the Youth Advisory Board. Membership will be capped at 30 youth.

The first meeting will consist of icebreakers and team building activities. The program will be outlined for the

youth. There are 13 modules.

Subsequent meetings will be held at Vincent Torres Park, 4340 NW 36th Street, Lauderdale Lakes, FL 33319. Two certified teachers will facilitate the meeting. Several volunteers will assist will facilitation of the meeting/conference.

OKAY Institute will solicit volunteers. The volunteers will complete an application as well as a security clearance. Volunteers must complete a screening process and be approved by the Board of Directors of OKAY Institute.

Day in the Life

Youth will sign-in and be offered lunch and a snack. Next, students will get their supplies needed for the particular module. The teacher will introduce the module to the group. The 4C's will be incorporated within each module to promote youth's thinking. Youth will continue group discussion and work on a hands-on project. Youth will end workshop by participating in a group talk to summarize the day's lesson.

This will be accomplished by providing NSCF workshops to train 5 teachers already working within juvenile detention facilities and/or probation services. There are 2 full-day workshops, plus one year of additional on-line resources, testing and support with a total cost of \$500 per participant (\$250 per workshop). Training is delivered by NSCF staff within larger workshops.

Each site will be provided with chessboards, sets, a demonstration board and a workbook.

In addition, NSCF will provide a senior instructor to act as a master-teacher helping further develop the skills of the teachers trained and also providing direct instruction to students who are progressing to an intermediate playing ability and beyond.

Part 1 - Young Offenders:

Training for 5 teachers already employed in the correctional facilities. There are 2 full-day workshops, plus one year of additional on-line resources, testing and support with a total cost of \$500 per participant (\$250 per workshop). Cost \$2,500. The training is delivered by NSCF staff within larger workshops.

Each site will be provided with chessboards, sets, a demonstration board and workbooks for each student. Each site is allocated \$200 for materials*. Cost \$1,000.

In addition, 2 sites (Broward Youth Treatment Center and Pompano Youth Treatment Center) will receive 40 hours of direct instruction from a NSCF-provided instructor at a cost of \$40 per hour. (\$1600 per site = \$3,200).

Each site will be provided with chessboards, sets, a demonstration board and workbooks, plus on-line resources for each student. Each site is allocated \$200 for materials. Cost \$1,000.

In addition, 2 sites (Scotia Northwestern Inc. and AARLCC will receive 30 hours of direct instruction from a NSCF-provided instructor at a cost of \$40 per hour. (\$1200 per site = \$2,400)

*Custom chess mats are \$8 each; pieces are \$4 per set (12 boards and sets per location) = \$144; demonstration board is \$32; workbook is \$14 = \$190 per site.



3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

The proposed program addresses the LETF Category of Crime Prevention as it specifically creates, promotes and offers holistic supports including music engagement, field trips and community service activities that expose students to positive activities and behaviors that prevent and or reduce the likelihood of engagement in criminal behavior, especially during the after school hours where the likely of juvenile crime spikes. According to a longitudinal survey of youth conducted by the U.S. Department of Labor, high school students who earned few or no arts credits were five times more likely not to have graduated than students who earned many arts credit. Additionally, a report from a non-profit anti-crime organization, Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, dropouts are 3.5 times more likely to be arrested than high school graduates and more than eight times as likely to be incarcerated. Research further show that students who participate regularly in the arts have higher GPAs and score higher on standardized tests.

Broward County have seen its fair share of juvenile crimes, some of which have received widespread media attention and require immediate action. Hence, the Mighty Marching Dragons program also addresses the Sheriff's priority area of Diverting Youth from the criminal justice system by exposing them to the arts after school and keeping them off the streets without supervision. The instruction received from this program serves as a medium to prevent or reduce the likelihood of crime involvement. The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention encourages children to use their creative talents because, "arts and performances help youth develop a sense of identity, independence, discipline, and self-worth. Exposing them to music and art experiences teach themes how to address challenging situations and prevent or reduce crime and violence among performers involved. Research has also indicated that students who participate in band, orchestra, chorus, or drama are significantly less likely than non-participants to drop out of school, be arrested, use drugs, or engage in binge drinking. The Mighty Marching Dragons program will provide a comprehensive music programming that will actively engage and equip students with skills that will aid in improving test scores, as well as positively contributing to their community.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

Funding is required to support an afterschool crime prevention music appreciation program that divert students from truancy. The Florida legislature Office of Economic and Demographic Research, indicates that Broward County ranks 12th in Florida in crimes and 24th in violent crimes. The county's juvenile delinquency rate is 3,490 juveniles per 1000. Broward County zip codes with the highest incidents of crime include 33312, where the program is offered, and the surrounding neighborhoods of 33309, 33311, 33313 and 33319 are 33351. Like other at-risk communities in Florida, crime continues to be a major cause of concern for Broward County and these communities are not conducive to healthy and positive alternatives to crime. 90% of SHS students and the participants in the Mighty Marching Dragons program live in communities indicated above, that are often characterized by high levels of unemployment, poverty, low levels of educational attainment and an overall lack of resources and opportunities to accomplish social and economic empowerment. To find a solution to these challenges, some youth engage in criminal activities.

According to the Florida Department of Education, the high school graduation rate in Broward County for the 2015-2016 academic year stands at 76.5%. However, research points out that youth from under-resourced

communities especially African-Americans, have lower graduation rates than their counterparts from more affluent neighborhoods. Bryant (2013) conjures that one-third of African-American students across the nation fail to graduate from High School. The National Education Association (NEA) theorizes that High School dropout rates are prevalent in some rapidly growing racial/ethnic groups. The greatest population growth in the U.S. is among racial and ethnic groups that have traditionally had lower levels of educational attainment, such as high school diplomas and college degrees).

The Florida Black Youth Status report stated that there are approximately 40-60 gangs in Broward County with an average age range of 14-24 years old comprising both males and females. Research from the Urban Health Institute at John Hopkins University reports that gangs tend to flourish in communities where educational and job opportunities are poor, social institutions are weak, and fear of gun violence is high. Youth gangs are responsible for the majority of serious violence in the United States and commit a disproportionate share of offenses.

Greenwood (2008) suggested that there are many reasons to prevent youth from exposure to criminal activities. The most obvious reason is that these activities place youth at-risk for drug use and dependency, school drop-out, incarceration, injury, early pregnancy, and adult criminality. Therefore, if the program can save students from a life of crime, that's a life saved. Therefore, once the student show interest in participating, even with limited or advanced proficiency, the goal is to incorporate them into the program to avoid their participation in negative behavioral or lifestyle choices afterschool that lead to the above mentioned acts. It is of utmost importance that crime prevention strategies are implemented to divert additional Broward County youth from engaging in criminal activities.

The Marching Dragon Band Boosters is requesting LETF to underwrite in part, band tuition dues for (12) students and travel costs for (25) students whose families qualify for the federal free/reduced school lunch program; and the repairing of (12) instruments (tubers, trumpets, and saxophones). Through a music appreciation program such as the Mighty Marching Dragons, the community sees firsthand how exposure to the fine arts has a positive impact on youth, particularly those from low-income, at-risk households.

Who

The program will serve 120 students who self-select to participate in the program. Students enter the program, some with limited or advanced musical talent, and with the help of Band Director, Carlos Redman, graduate with an advanced musical mastery in the selected instrument of choice. 90% of the band members either reside in a high crime area, is on free and reduced lunch and is low to middle income racial and ethnic minorities. Existing participants' compositions comprise of 98% African-American and the remaining 2% Hispanic, Caribbean or other. All of these population segments bring about unique barriers and program needs that vary from traditional music programs. While there is no restrictions to join the program, band members are required to pay yearly band dues of \$250, which is a financial burden for many members. While there are no income requirements to become a band member, approximately 90% of the students' parents are low/moderate income level. The Marching Dragon Band Boosters is committed to meeting the needs of all students and implementing needed programs. The successes of the program include, but are not limited to, improvement in the overall musical ability of members, and improvement in attitudes and behaviors. The support provided by the program have also enabled a majority of these juveniles to possibly avoid after-school criminal mischief, but instead transition into productive musically inclined graduates.

What

The Mighty Marching Dragons is an existing program which has been a tradition and favorite of South Florida for over 50 years. It is a band like no other in its district, taking classic military precision and mixing it with the saucy, rhythmic high step of the south. The competitive band membership consists of only the most disciplined brass (trumpets, trombones, French horns, baritones, tubas); woodwind (flutes, saxophones); percussion musicians; auxiliary; and drum majors who wows all of its competition with its unique style of dance, cadences, and melodies of popular music. Last year, The Mighty Marching Dragons received an excellent rating and over the past three years, has left an undeniable mark on the lives of over 700 students who have successfully participated in the program.

The program will support participants in a school-based environment by providing music education, competitions, concert performance, community service and field trips. Incoming band members are recruited from feeder schools, Parkway and New River Middle. Students that participate in the program will improve their attention span, learn faster, and develop higher level of critical thinking skills. The main objective is to foster growth in academia, moral character, and appreciation of music through high standards of performance for our school and community via a holistic music program that will empower students and enhance their chances of attaining future success.

In addition to school sessions, the band complements its music curriculum with the following components that enhances the existing program design:

Performances/Competitions: These experiences will benefits students by granting them the chance to compete and/or perform while connecting with their community, and to view their peers in a competitive light. Performances may include out of town Battle of the Bands competitions, where students have the prospect of meeting band directors from colleges such as Bethune-Cookman University, Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University, Alabama State University, and Norfolk State University. During Battle of the Bands competitions, students' progress will be measured and rating comments provided by assessing judges. These interactions are critical to public school's college and career readiness standards. Furthermore, these performances will provide many opportunities that can complement, enhance, and expand on what students learn in school, while exposing them to a wide array of enrichment opportunities that enhance cognitive, social, emotional, and moral growth and development.

Field Trips/Community Service: These provide well needed exposure to activities that at-risk youth would not typically have access to such as battle of the bands competitions at Disney world and Universal Studios. These out of town competitions offer youth the opportunity to experience unfamiliar environments which allow them to think beyond their community. The program will also incorporate monthly trips such as the Miami Veteran's Day Parade, Martin Luther King Day parade, Orange Bowl parade, North Lauderdale Holiday parade, St. Patrick's Day parade, Sistrunk parade and Deerfield Pioneer Days to students to aid in their exposure to other fine arts. A 2011 report by Kellington points out that youth need to attend field trips as they are vital components of school instruction, if not only to improve grades, but for them to feel, see, touch, and even taste the real world around them. Furthermore, field trips will enrich and expand the music appreciation curriculum, strengthen observation skills by immersing them into sensory activities and increase their knowledge base in various disciplines.

Where

The Mighty Marching Dragons program is held at 1800 SW 5th Place in Fort Lauderdale. All band practices will be held on the campus of Stranahan High School, but performance, battle of the bands competitions and field trips will be held at various offsite locations. These competitions and performances instills a sense of personal responsibility and team-building that is essential in their personal and academic development.

The Mighty Marching Dragons provides 40 weeks of structured practices after school, Monday through Thursday, from 3:00 pm - 5:00 pm and during the summer, 8:00 am - 2:00 pm.

Many of the students have shown an interest in band membership, but due to financial constraints are unable to participate. Additionally, there are 300 broken instruments in need of repairing. The Marching Dragon Band Boosters does not have the funds to repair the instruments, and as a result the band has to limit the amount of students due to the limiting number of working instruments. The repairing of 12 instruments and the financial tuition offset will provide an opportunity for new members.

Brothers of the Pompano Beach Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi through the Kappa Foundation partner with at-risk youth to communicate the importance of positive behavior, displaying leadership qualities and setting college and career goals. The Kappa Leadership Development League currently consists of approximately 50 young men aging in the range of 13-18 throughout Broward County. Under the supervision of the Pompano Beach Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., the young men will conduct meetings every other Sunday at Broward College from September 2017 through June 2018. There will be a total of 12 workshops. Speakers and facilitators are invited to discuss and interact with the young men on creating a positive self-image, dressing for success, etiquette training, proper hygiene, and social mannerisms and personal responsibility. It is important to teach and share with the young men their responsibility of giving back. To accomplish this, the program has implemented the Neighbors Helping Neighbors Thanksgiving Drive. This project provides a Thanksgiving basket, including the turkey and trimmings, to approximately 650 needy families within the Broward County area, more specifically in Golden Acres Housing Project (Pompano), Stanley Terrace (Deerfield) and Veterans Park. This event takes place each year during the month of November. Also in the area of giving back to the community, the Kappa foundation will host a technology immersion summer computer camp for approximately 30 student residents of Golden Acres Community, Pompano Beach, FL. The students in this community do not have immediate access to local libraries of resource centers because of the distance they are located from their homes; thus creating a digital divide. The computer camp will run during June of 2017 and will run for two weeks. The students will work with computers, laptops and printers. 

Community Reconstruction Housing, Inc. (CRH) is a not-for-profit community-based organization that delivers delinquency prevention services to at-risk youth who reside in communities with high delinquency referral rates. Through the Rites of Passage (ROP) program, case managers and life coaches (who serve in a "mentor-like" role) deliver evidence-, strength-, and gender-based programming to middle-school youth who possess risk factors typically associated with delinquency. Other programming includes anti-bullying, mental health/substance abuse counseling, health and wellness, career assessment and workforce development, and tutoring to improve academic performance, and increase social skills and leadership development. CRH was established in 2011 and has operated the ROP for over 15 years via local faith-based organizations. Currently CRH employs a staff over ten (10) professionals experienced in delivering services to youth and has secured funds from the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, the City of Pompano Beach, the Children's Services Council of Broward County, and the Broward Sheriff's Office. The mission to provide "Educational, Leadership, and Employment opportunities to minority and impoverished citizens."

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

Judicial Circuit 17 has one of Florida's highest rates of referral for delinquency where minority youth are disproportionately represented. Youth served by CRH typically possess risk factors associated with delinquency – negative peer associations, poor academic performance, familial history with law enforcement/justice system, and a history of behavioral issues in the school setting. The ROP focuses on the needs of these youth by delivering the ROP in the school setting (Cypress Run Education Center) where life coaches and case managers work collaboratively to address behavioral and academic concerns as they arise and serve as an advocate for the parent(s) who, because of work commitments, are unable to meet with teachers. Social and leadership skills are taught to cultivate positive and pro-social response to conflict and tutoring is provided to promote academic performance, increase graduation rates, and develop skills and education necessary to compete for jobs in Broward County's highly competitive job market. Since the start of the ROP, no youth who has successfully completed the ROP has been referred to the juvenile justice or adult correctional system.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

Experts agree certain risk factors associated with delinquency including poor academic performance, insufficient adult supervision, familial history with law enforcement, poverty, and negative peer associations. Over 50% of households in the target community are at or below the poverty line. 82% of these students reside in a household that is defined as economically disadvantaged and 10% are English Language Learners. According to the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, Judicial Circuit 17 (Broward County) has one of the highest delinquency referral rates in the State; during fiscal year 14/15 there were 4,777 youth arrests. Black youth represent 68% of these arrests. During the same period, 36% of youth on intake status were minority, 10% of youth arrests involved school-related crimes (up from 8% in 2013/2014), and the number of low risk commitments increased by 2%. During fiscal year 13/14 a total of 300 youth were arrested in zip codes 33060, 33062, 33064, and 33069; 61 were violent felony offenses.

5. Describe the program in detail and how it will be implemented: (Describe Who, What, Where, and When)

The ROP is a minimum of six (6) months and provides an array of services that meet the typical needs and strengths of at-risk boys. Utilizing Florida Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) recognized evidence-based programs, youth coaches deliver pro-social, cognitive restructuring, health and wellness, anti-bullying, appropriate gender skills training in the group setting. Working in collaboration with school administrators and teachers, youth receive these services in the home school. This supports effective communication of changing needs (e.g., academic performance, behavior, and attendance) between teachers and youth coaches; youth coaches communicate these needs to parents and the ROP case manager. The case manager works in the school and the home to identify youth and family needs, make referrals for additional services (housing, mental health, substance abuse, employment) and developing a comprehensive service plan. The case manager will also conduct an assessment with the youth and the parent(s). The ROP Program is funded by the Community Foundation and the Children's Services Council of Broward County and partners with the School Board of Broward County. Funding from the Broward Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Trust Fund grant will allow for money to hire Florida-certified teachers to provide tutoring to youth admitted to the Program in math and reading. Tutoring will be provided a minimum of three (3) time per week.

CRH contracts with a consultant to assist in the development of program curriculum; develop and provide training to employees in operational, reporting, and human resources; and conduct quarterly quality assurance activities to ensure compliance and fidelity to evidence-based practices utilized by CRH. It is anticipated the total hours per week will not exceed ten (10) over 24 weeks of the program year.

Program services will be provided by life coaches and case managers who work in the community. This will allow the case manager to reach the youth in his/her natural environment (school, home) and his/her support network (parents, teachers) and requires access to Program materials.

The Program has a quarterly Community Service Learn project that promotes community identity, leadership, and allows youth to apply skills taught via the Program. This includes a community garden, community mural, and other activities developed by youth and supervised by life coaches. Transportation in the amount of \$2,000.00 is requested to assist CRH is getting youth to and from sites where community service is performed or field trips are conducted. All offsite activities directly support the skills learning taught to youth. Field trips include seminar, tours of local businesses, pro-social leisure activities that promote pro-social learning, development of pro-social peer connections, promote education or a vocational skill, or allow opportunity to apply leadership skills. \$2,000.00 is requested for entry fees for youth.

2. Program Summary (1-3 sentences): Provide an overview of program services.

Grant funding is requested to support the School is Cool (SIC) program at Margate Middle School, a low-performing school identified as needing support by Broward County Public Schools. Participating students receive specialized support in deficient attendance, behavior, and course performance (ABC) areas through incentives-based programming, peer tutoring, mentoring, specialized attention, and reading, math, and science instruction from the Crockett Foundation. SIC prepares students to transition to high school with the confidence and motivation to achieve academic success, ultimately leading to on-time high school graduation.

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

The School is Cool program addresses the Safe Neighborhood LETF Criteria as well as the Diverting Youth from the Criminal Justice System Priority Area by providing specialized support to Margate Middle School students who demonstrate deficiencies in attendance, behavior, and course performance (ABCs). Through this program, students receive incentives-based programming, peer tutoring, mentoring, specialized attention, and reading, math, and science instruction with the goal of improving their ABCs.

School is Cool encourages academic and social success among low-performing youth as well as provides engaging and structured activities afterschool and during the summer when youth might otherwise be unsupervised. Activities take place year-round August to May, Monday to Friday 11:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., during the school day; Monday, 3:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., after school; and Monday to Thursday, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., during the summer (mid June to late July).

Now going on its fourth year at Margate Middle School, the School is Cool program has demonstrated success in the areas below. The Crockett Foundation will continue to track and collect data to ensure continued success. A detailed description of program components is provided in Question 5.

Course performance:

90% of target students show improvement in reading/language arts and math as demonstrated by quarterly course grade, and/or demonstrative learning gains based on battery assessments and/or movement by at least one level or increased percentage points on standardized tests.

Via individual peer tutoring and mentoring taking place four (4) hours per week, youths' progress will be tracked weekly in the Time4Learning and After the Bell curricula. Overall course improvement of at least one level or increased percentage points, as compared to the prior year, in the Math and Reading Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) or an alternative standardized assessment will demonstrate improvement by the end of the school year.

Attendance:

90% of target students improve school attendance, as demonstrated by no more than 5 absences per quarter/student (excused or unexcused).

Bi-weekly group sessions, conducted by the Program Manager, School Specialist, and Mentors, will teach students positive behaviors and encourage overall school success. Each student's school attendance will be monitored monthly by the School Specialist who will obtain attendance records from Margate Middle School's attendance office. The Crockett Foundation's data management system and procedures will ensure that program staff monitor attendance regularly and adjust strategies as needed, based on real-time attendance rates to maintain a rate of 75% or higher. The Crockett Foundation uses a web-based, customer relationship management system (CRM), Salesforce.com, and its Scholar Management System to manage its scholar enrollment, attendance and reporting. To encourage and motivate students to attend school, youth with perfect attendance will receive incentives including promotional items, movie passes and store gift cards on a monthly basis.

Behavior:

90% of target students improve in behavior (reduction of referrals and/or suspensions, and decreased behavior incidences).

Bi-weekly group sessions will be conducted by the Program Manager and will focus on positive youth development. Student behavior, as it pertains to referrals, suspensions, and/or behavior incidences, will be measured and evaluated by designated school staff on a monthly basis. In addition, staff will administer pre- and post-tests to youth to ascertain knowledge gain on behavioral assessment test tools.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

The School is Cool program is needed to facilitate the academic and behavioral success of struggling students who are a serious risk of continued and future academic failure, disciplinary action, and/or juvenile delinquency. Margate

Middle School (MMS), a triple C-rated school, is one of three middle schools feeding into Coconut Creek High School – a D-rated high school that has been identified as having one of Broward County's lowest graduation rates. Students at MMS are in great need of supplemental academic and afterschool services to increase their chance of success in both middle and high school as well as keep them busy during afterschool hours when they might otherwise be left unsupervised.

Of the 1,363 students enrolled at MMS, students identify as African-American(51.1%), Hispanic (25.4%), White (15.8%), Asian (3.7%), Two Races (3.2%), American Indian (.5%), and Pacific Islander (.2%). Student performance in state reading and math exams places MMS in the bottom 50% of Florida middle schools – lower than both district and state performance levels. While African-American students make up the largest segment of the student body, they have achieved the lowest levels of proficiency in reading and math among the four main ethnic groups at the school. Only 39% are proficient in reading and 43% are proficient in math.

With a median household income in Margate of \$42,599 per year, many students are eligible for the National School Lunch Program. Children from families with incomes at or below 130% (\$31,525 for a family of four) of the poverty level are eligible for free meals. Those with incomes between 130% and 185% (\$44,862) of the poverty level are eligible for reduced-price meals. Among students at MMS, 71% are eligible for free lunch and 7% for reduced lunch, compared to the state's levels of 52% and 6%, respectively. An analysis by ProPublica found that states and schools provide poor students fewer educational programs like Advanced Placement, gifted and talented programs, and advanced math and science classes. Studies have linked participation in these programs with better outcomes later in life. Margate Middle School's enrollment rate for gifted and talented is three percent, compared to six percent throughout the state.

Moreover, looking at disciplinary trends, MMS's in-school suspension rate of 16.6% is more than double the state's rate of 7.3%, while referrals to law enforcement are four times as high at 1.6%.

5. Describe the program in detail and how it will be implemented: (Describe Who, What, Where, and When)

Students who are deficient in reading/language arts and/or math, demonstrated by low standardized test scores Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) and/or failing grades of D/F are specifically targeted for participation in the School is Cool program. Incoming 6th graders who are identified as having deficient levels and/or "C" averages in reading/language arts and/or math are recruited, thus increasing the likelihood of success throughout their middle school years. Additionally, 7th and 8th grade students, including those who previously participated in School is Cool, and are deficient in the ABCs or received low standardized test scores, are also targeted for enrollment.

The Crockett Foundation's School is Cool program takes place throughout the entire year — during the school day, after school, and during the summer. School Day programming consists of Scholastic After the Bell and Time4Learning (described below) instruction of reading/language arts, math/financial literacy, and science during Period 7, Monday to Friday, 2:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Throughout the school day, Monday to Friday, 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., Crockett Foundation staff conduct class pushins and student pull-outs. Push-ins consist of staff members sitting in struggling students' class, alternating students, to assist in bridging the gap between teachers and students. Student pull-outs may take place to meet one-on-one with students to address behavioral incidences or infractions. Margate Middle School provides an office to the Crockett Foundation as well as a classroom and access to a computer lab to meet with students and operate the program.

After school programming takes place on Mondays from 3:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. After school programming consists of peer tutoring to support BCPS curriculum, mentoring, incentives-based activities, optional components (fine arts, athletics, debate, and career and tech exploration), and additional instructional or one-on-one support to accommodate student's specialized needs.

Summer programming takes place mid June to late July, Monday to Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and consists of computer coding activities, fine arts, STEAM, financial literacy, tutoring, and credit remediation.

To improve course performance in reading/language arts and math, the Crocket Foundation uses:

- •Scholastic After the Bell: a research-based reading curriculum designed for grades 1-8 to improve phonetic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.
- •Time4Learning: an online, interactive, student-paced middle school curriculum that can be used for skill building in math, language arts, science, and social studies, which are standards-based and correlate to Florida state standards.
- •Peer tutoring: a partnership with Peer Tutors that provides high school students from Ft Lauderdale High, Monarch High, North Broward Preparatory School, and Cardinal Gibbons High to serve as peer tutors. Peer tutors work closely with School is Cool students to provide assistance with homework, After the Bell and Time4Learning curricula, and additional instructional strategies.

To improve attendance and behavior, the Program Manager works closely with Margate Middle School staff and visits high schools to meet with peer tutors and strategize ways to best work with each student in the program. The Program Manager meets with students as needed, and/or as scheduled by school staff, to discuss challenges the student may be experiencing and strategize possible solutions.

The Attendance Incentive Plan encourages regular attendance and retention. The plan recognizes and celebrates youth participants for performance and gains in each area of the ABCs. To ensure strong engagement early in the program and establish consistent attendance habits, the Program Manager will create an attendance incentive system that awards students who attend the full program week with a promotional item, such as water bottles, key chains, etc. This will connect participants with the program, following which incentives will be provided quarterly based on achievement of key milestones, using student points to reinforce attendance, behavior, and course performance consistent with the Crockett Foundation's ABCs and group expectations.

All students are awarded a point every day at the beginning of the program day to reinforce their attendance and more are awarded throughout the day or week for good behavior and participation in academic, enrichment, and youth development activities. The mechanism for earning performance-based incentives will incorporate input from the participants, to foster leadership, freedom to exercise choice, and commitment to program standards. Groupwide incentives, such as pizza parties or popcorn and a movie will be used to reward peer collaboration and support. Participants will also be given many opportunities to develop positive and trusting relationships with adults involved with program, including program staff, school staff and administrators, and families which have been shown to keep youth engaged in programming.

The Crockett Foundation is a proponent of technology and innovation. To keep students actively engaged and up to speed, each student is provided with an iPad to use for instructional activities and homework assistance. To further inspire and encourage students, mentors from the business community provide motivational speeches to students discussing topics such as goal setting, career paths, the importance of education, etc.

Students participate in non-school day field trips designed to provide exploration of local cultural institutions, further content knowledge in targeted academic areas, and engage and retain participants. Activities may include visits to the Fort Lauderdale Museum of Art, Junior Achievement, and/or attend a game (Dolphins, Marlins, or Panthers).

The Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) is a nonprofit organization serving Broward County's senior residents, 60 years of age and older, as well as younger victims of Alzheimer's Disease. The mission of the ADRC is to plan, coordinate, monitor, evaluate and fund various groups, agencies, organizations and projects relating to the elderly. Our body, initiated in 1972 and incorporated in 1974, was the first in the State. The ADRC has grown from an agency umbrella that provided approximately \$78,000 in services in 1974 to one that currently administers over \$21,000,000 for elderly programs. We receive federal and state funds, as well as dollars from cities and county government. Individual donations and fundraising efforts contribute to our endeavors, to help meet the need of our elderly residents. Our nonprofit entity funds services such as: adult day care; meals on wheels; respite (facility/in-home); caregiver training; transportation; home improvement, and legal assistance. Since November 1, 2013, the ADRC has played a key role in the Long-term Care (LTC) Program, by providing information and education about managed long term care, as well as assisting seniors with intake, assessment, and eligibility determinations.

For 24 years, the Senior Intervention and Education Program (SIEP) has helped frail, low income seniors care for themselves at home through education, advocacy, and by providing adaptive equipment which makes their daily living activities safer. The unique Outreach Program targets homebound and isolated elders who have no means of transportation, little contact with the outside world, and are struggling to "age in place" with dignity. The SIEP aids police and hospital personnel work with these elders to avoid abuse and or exploitation.

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

The Senior Intervention and Education Program addresses the LETF Criteria, as well as, the Sheriff's Priority Area through its delivery of services to the "hidden" population of Broward County. Too often, frail, vulnerable, isolated elders are neglected and abandoned by the "system." Seniors encounter numerous obstacles as they struggle to secure assistance through governmental and private pay programs while avoiding scams that may destroy their limited incomes. Some of the greatest barriers, encountered by all consumers, include: financial (have no health insurance or being underinsured); cultural and language differences; lack of education; personal barriers; sexual orientation; environmental challenges especially for people with disabilities; and abuse (self, familial, and social environmental).

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

The Senior Intervention and Education Program seeks to address the issues of crime prevention including the issues of self and/or outside abuse leading to the degradation of elders' lives. Many of our clients are referrals from neighbors, police, and other community entities aware of the struggle isolated seniors encounter when endeavoring to cope with the problems of daily living

According to the Department of Elder Affairs (DOEA), 2016 County Profile Data, Broward County's senior population 60 years of age, and older, represent 22.5% of the population. Over 47,674 residents have reached their 85th birthday. Approximately 40,637 individuals 65 years of age, and older are medically underserved, and 57,419 suffer with at least one type of disability. Depression symptoms are commonly found in people whose function has become limited. Minor depression affects 15% to 20% of community dwelling old persons, and it is known to compromise health and quality of life and to be a significant barrier to one's ability to access services.

Many Older Americans formerly were independently able to care for their own needs, and remain fairly safe in their local communities. Frailty, loss of a spouse and/or other familial support have subjected many to be dependent on society and definitely open to criminal attacks in personal or mental formats. In addition, they may be physically, emotionally and/or financially abused.

Unfortunately, statistics on exactly how many seniors have become victims of financial fraud or exploitation formally are not captured. Often, they are not reported to authorities out of shame or embarrassment. But there is growing evidence that the problem is substantial. The Federal Trade Commission's Consumer Sentinea Network database, which collects consumer complaints and makes them available to law enforcement, contained 123,757 fraud complaints in 2013 from victims who had identified themselves as aged 60 and over. A 2011 study by MefLife estimated that the annual loss to elderly victims of financial fraud (perpetrated by strangers) and abuse (perpetrated by family, friends or neighbors) was at least \$2.9 billion, a 12 percent hike over its 2008 estimate. (The Pew Charitable Trust, 2014)

Our project is the only one of its kind in Florida. It employs a licensed practical nurse to intervene on behalf of the clients, and endeavor to make certain their living environments are safe, and their nutritional and economic needs are met. Unfortunately, State and Federal funding do not provide financial assistance for this model project, so we must rely on our own fundraising efforts to sustain the position.

Four major issues pose a challenge and threat to our local community, including: (1) increasing levels of disability that restrict mobility and capacity for independence as Browardians reach older ages; (2) influx of Baby Boomers entering retirement; (3) lack of knowledge of elder abuse/fraud/exploitation and other criminal acts among health professionals in the field of geriatrics; and (4) limited funding and budget restrictions to adequately meet the services needs of the targeted population.

5. Describe the program in detail and how it will be implemented: (Describe Who, What, Where, and When)

The Senior Intervention and Education Program (SIEP) is designed to support needy seniors' efforts to remain independent and safe within their homes. The outreach program targets homebound and isolated elders, 60 years of age, and older, who are plagued by the affects of aging, illness, and disability. Over the past 24 years, one Staff Member, has developed and expanded a pilot project into a national model of excellence, worthy of duplication. Annually, 150-200 elders are recipient of services, some of which can be referred to as the "hidden" population of Broward County, while others are found on long waiting list requiring immediate attention. The SIEP is housed within the ADRC. Referrals are received from various entities, including, but not limited to: Broward Sheriff's Office; Hospitals; Doctors; Elderly Service Providers; and Social Service Agencies. A home visit may provide evidence of abuse, neglect and exploitation, misuse of medications, food insecurities, and lack of in-home assistance. Community outreach efforts are also fundamental in identifying individuals who may be in need of some assistance. Presentations, highlighting fraud, abuse and scams, are held in community settings, such as day cares, community centers, and faith based organizations. Quarterly presentations are scheduled targeting professionals who work day-today with seniors. Informational material is distributed to libraries, community centers, and elderly housing facilities. The following services are utilized to help meet the clients' immediate needs: case management; consumable medical supplies; caregiver training and support; disease information; referral; counseling; application assistance; and specialized medical equipment. Community partnerships play a major role in the program successes. For example, the Staff employs a donated vehicle, from Al Hendrickson, which allows the personnel to travel to seniors' homes, in order to assess their living environment and resources, as well as, evaluate the clients' abilities to function within their residences. The automobile is loaded with adaptive equipment, nonprescriptive items, clothing, and other donated materials. The Senior Intervention and Education Program is able to maintain a collection of donated consumable supplies and specialized equipment through the benevolence of community organizations and individuals. The Program has proven to be vitally important to frail, low-income elders and community providers by providing an immediate response to their inquiries and by filling the gap between need and service delivery. The Areawide Council on Aging (d/b/a the Aging & Disability Resource Center) of Broward County's, experience in serving the targeted population, is evidenced by its recognition on the state/national level, as the designated local one-stop shop for senior services. The Senior Intervention and Education Program is uniquely designed to help the nonprofit entity achieve its stated mission. The program in solely supported by grants, donations, and fundraising efforts. Funding is needed to support the Staff Member personnel costs/salaries, fringe benefits, and to continue this vitally important program, which helps to educate our most vulnerable population about potential criminal acts against them and an ease of access to services to keep them in their accustomed environment.

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

Abyssinian Baptist Church sees our EEGP mentorship program effectively producing a **Safe Neighborhood** by diverting our at-risk youth from the **Criminal Justice System**. EEGP will give our children a wholesome view of themselves along with a providing a strong support system, resulting in them making better choices for their lives which in effect will significantly reduce their likelihood of engaging in criminal behavior and other self-deprecating behaviors, thus creating a safer Pompano neighborhood.

Pompano Has A Crime Problem

Our area children live, attend schools and churches, and play in a high crime area. A quick search online reveals that Pompano Beach, FL is not safe at all when compared to other locations, similar-sized or otherwise, in the US. Neighborhoodscout.com uses FBI crime stats for their analysis (https://www.neighborhoodscout.com/fl/pompanobeach/crime). These facts were stated:

- With a crime rate of 53 per one thousand residents, Pompano Beach has one of the highest crime rates in America compared to all communities of all sizes from the smallest towns to the very largest cities.
- The chances of becoming a victim of either violent or property crime is 1:19.
- Within Florida, more than 90% of the communities have a lower crime rate than Pompano Beach.
- With a population of 107,762, Pompano Beach has a combined rate of violent and property crime that is very high compared to other places of similar population size.
- Pompano Beach was found to have one of the highest violent crime rates is in the nation, across communities
 of all sizes (both large and small). Violent offenses tracked included rape, murder and non-negligent

manslaughter, armed robbery, and aggravated assault, including assault with a deadly weapon. The chances of becoming a victim of one of these crimes in Pompano Beach is 1:114.

- A lot of the crime that takes place in Pompano Beach is property crime. Property crimes that are tracked for this analysis are burglary, larceny over fifty dollars, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The chances of becoming a victim of a property crime is 1:23, which is a rate of 44 per one thousand population.
- Pompano Beach has one of the highest rates of motor vehicle theft in the nation. The chances of getting your car stolen if you live in Pompano Beach is 1:205

The Challenges Our Youth Face

Per a national study done by The National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University (June 2011), substance abuse in adolescence is America's number 1 public health problem. The following findings were mentioned:

- Before the age of 18, 9 out of 10 high school students where seen to have met the criteria for addiction and had already started drinking, smoking, and using illicit or prescription drugs.
- 3/4 of U.S. high school students have drunk alcohol, used another drug and smoked cigarettes. 2/3 of high school students have taken more than one substance which is addictive.
- About 34.4 million (46.1%) of the children under 18 usually live with a risky substance abuser. After friends, the family or the home is one most common source of substances which are addictive.
- There are 1.6 million students who meet the medical criteria to have disorders in substance use which involves other drugs and alcohol but only 6.4% of them have received treatment the previous year.

Based on the results from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) which presented the findings on the mental health utilized by the youth, ages 12 to 17, regarding any behavioral and emotional problems, the following were concluded:

- There were 8% of the youth aged 12 to 17 (approximately 1.9 million) in 2010 who had major depressive episode (MDE) during the previous year. 5.8% of these had MDE with severe impairment.
- Females were more likely to have MDE with the figure of 11.8% compared to males who only have 4.4%.
- Of the 2.9 million youths aged 12 to 17 in 2010, the top 3 most likely reason for receiving mental health services was feeling depressed (47.6%), followed by having problems at home (30.5%), and breaking rules and "acting out" (25%).

In addition, a report done by Surgeon General on the mental health conditions of children and adolescents says that:

• 1 in every 10 children and adolescents in the United States experience severe mental illness that causes some level of impairment. Yet only less than 1 of 5 children have received the appropriate treatment.

In 2007-2008, the result of the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES) conducted by the National Center for Health Statistics claimed the following:

- Approximately 16.9% of 16 to 19 year old children and adolescents in the United States are obese.
- The degree of obesity increased during 2007-2008 for children and adolescents aged 6-19, with 19.6% for 6-11 years old and 18.1% for ages 12-19 years old.

A fact sheet from a The Guttmacher Institute provided the following data:

- There is 13% of teens who admitted to have had sexual experience by age 15. Before age 20, 7 among 10 teens, male and female, has already had intercourse.
- Teenagers in the United States are more likely to have a sexual experience before they reach 15 years old, 11% of single females and 14% of single males) in 2006-2008.
- 1 in every 5 teen girls is in the risk of an unplanned pregnancy, in fact 19% of them claimed to have not used any contraceptives during their previous intercourse.
- Teen mothers are often unable to complete high school and only less than 2% of these teen moms attain a college degree when they reach 30.

Why EEGP Meets LETF Statutory Requirements & The Sheriff's Priority

EEGP diverts our children from choosing crime and helps make our neighborhood safer. We are preparing for 30 young mentees, between the ages of 13 - 17, for 35 weeks, particularly from the Blanche Ely, Canal Point, Pine Tree Park, Sanders Park, Liberty Park, Kendall Lakes, and Kendall Green neighborhoods which are areas plagued with poverty, crime, violence, and substance abuse. EEGP is a mentorship program that will:

- effectively reduce our mentees' likelihood of engaging in risky/self-deprecating behaviors such as violence, drug and alcohol use, early sexual activity, and the criminal activity rampant in Pompano Beach, FL
- improve life skills and critical thinking skills
- influence our mentees to make positive life choices
- expose our mentees to positive alternatives to crime and violence

Through our EEGP mentorship program, Abyssinian Baptist Church will be able to achieve many of these outcomes for our area youth. Our EEGP mentors will show them that they matter. Our EEGP discussions and activities will open our mentees up to new and better possibilities for their lives. And our EEGP incentive program will help keep them committed to completing the program.

Considering the aforementioned crime rates of Pompano Beach, FL coupled with the above challenges that our youth either are or will likely encounter, ABCC feels that our mentorship program will effectively divert our at-risk youth from the criminal justice system and help create safer neighborhoods.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

The Community Problem

Abyssinian Baptist Church recognizes that our youth, especially the ones in the named neighborhoods above, are at a higher risk for engaging in substance abuse and early sexual activity, and having behavioral and emotional problems. These are the underlying factors that very often lead to juvenile delinquency and criminal activities, decreasing safety in our neighborhoods.

Mentorship programs have a proven track record for effectively addressing these underlying factors that result in youth going into the criminal justice system.

Mentorship Program Stats

According to youth.gov, mentoring produces the following benefits:

- increased high school graduation rates,
- lower high school dropout rates,
- healthier relationships and lifestyle choices,
- better attitudes about school (Blakely, Menon, & Jones, 1995),
- higher college enrollment rates and higher education aspirations,
- enhanced self-esteem and self-confidence,
- improved behavior at school and home,
- stronger relationships with parents, teachers, and peers,
- improved_interpersonal_skills, and
- decreased likelihood of initiating drug and alcohol use (MENTOR, 2009; Cavell, DuBois, Karcher, Keller, & Rhodes, 2009).

Furthermore, mentorship programs have been shown to decrease illegal drug and alcohol use among youth. A Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) study showed youth with mentors were less likely to begin using drugs or alcohol during the eighteen-month period of the study than their peers. Specifically, 6.2 percent of youth with mentors initiated drug use compared to 11.4 percent of their peers without mentors, and 19.4 percent initiated alcohol use compared to 26.7 percent. These findings were more substantial for minority youth (Tierny et al., 1995). Findings from a study of the Across Ages mentoring program showed that mentees gained important life skills to help them stay away from drugs (LoSciuto, Rajala, Townsend, & Taylor, 1996).

Mentorship programs were also found to decrease violent behavior among youth. Mentees in the BBBS program were 32 percent less likely to report having hit someone over the past year than the young people without mentors (Tierny et al., 1995). Jekielek et al. (2002) found that four mentoring programs showed reductions of some behaviors related to delinquency and negative behaviors, but did not eliminate all delinquent behaviors.

The Conclusion

Mentorship programs work! Through its EEGP mentorship program, Abyssinian Baptist Church anticipates achieving many of the same outcomes in the Pompano Beach, FL community.

The Team

Abyssinian Baptist Church's Elite-Elegant Generation Program (EEGP) will be implemented by Pastor Terrance Kearney, Deacon Mark Harley, Deacon Mike Grace, and Youth Minister Cecelia Harley.

Pastor Kearney brings a wealth of knowledge and experience in community service stretching back almost 20 years. His community service resume includes founding and pastoring Abundant Life Fellowship Church in Riviera Beach growing the membership to over 500, conducting monthly outreaches in local neighborhoods, setting up a food distribution center for not-for-profit organizations serving the Palm Beach County, opening a community resource center called Project Exodus where he provided services such as employment assistance program, GED courses, after-school and summer programs, food and clothing distribution and budget/financial management program to approximately 217 families in the community and also sponsored college tours for high school students, started and co-managed Kingdom Connection International Network LLC, a limited liability company established for the purpose of promoting improved organizational structure to religious, faith-based and other non-profit organizations, developing solid foundations and infrastructures to facilitate further business expansion, implemented a mentorship program at a Palm Beach high school, and led a \$375k combined renovation of our church building, administration building, and our community center project as well as the purchase of land.

Deacon Mark Harley runs Focus On Leadership Global, Inc, a nonprofit organization that develops youth leaders. He is launching a summer camp that will develop youth in the leadership domains of integrity, connection, sensemaking, vision, action, and ownership as well as incorporating entrepreneurship training, vision-scaping, and creating life goals (www.folglobal.com/summer-camp). Mark holds a degree in Mathematics and has over 17 years in corporate America.

Deacon Mike Grace owns a couple of local businesses, iHaul and Miraculous Pools. He remains connected to the community, mentoring and employing young men. Mike is a native resident of Pompano Beach, Florida with deep roots in the community and heart for working with youth.

Youth Minister Cecelia Harley is a reading teacher at Pompano Middle School and has 10 years of teaching experience. She heads up various children activities through the church to include liturgical dance and choir. Cecelia holds an English degree and has been working with youth over 20 years.

The team will hire a part-time program coordinator to handle phone calls, coordinate field trips and activities, keep our books, and complete general office and light book-keeping duties in support of the program. We estimate this person will work on average approximately 13 hours a week over 35 weeks.

Youth Selection Process

This team will select 30 area youth between the ages of 13-17. Priority will be given to children from the Blanche Ely, Canal Point, Pine Tree Park, Sanders Park, Liberty Park, Kendall Lakes, and Kendall Green neighborhoods of Pompano

Beach, Florida. Selection will be based on the interview with the child and the parent(s)/guardian(s), school grades, and the merit of their application. Our pool of candidates will come from word-of-mouth and advertisements. We will advertise in newspapers, at local establishments, through our website, and through social media.

Mentor Selection Process

This team will also recruit qualified 10 mentors diversified by age, occupation, race, and gender. Mentor candidates will be responsible for completing a mentor application and supplying a current background check from the sheriff department. Selection will be based on application and a panel interview with the team.

Our Elite-Elegant Generation Program

EEGP is a 35-week mentorship program. The purpose of EEGP is to aid in the planning process of a career for each mentee by emphasizing the importance of core morals, values and discipline. Our objective is to open youth up to making positive life choices for themselves, their families, and their communities. Our participants will be linked with positive role models, engage in weekly discussions and group activities intended to challenge destructive and self-deprecating mindsets and perceptions, take enrichment field trips, and participate in an incentive program tying performance to a reward system.

The EEGP program will have a session each week. Our format will look like the following:

Weekly Objective - Our stated session objective(s)

5 minutes - Introduction of the topic of discussion along with a quote pertaining to the topic

40 minutes – Structured Discussion

15 minutes – Activity session with the possibility of winning a small gift

We will also incorporate our EEGP Reward Program which will be a points-system program where a mentee can earn a prize 3 times over the program (given every 12 weeks). Each person is responsible for his/her own incentive. A point is given for the following:

- Attendance
- The return of take home assignments
- Active Participation

A star chart with each mentee's name will be kept and updated accordingly when any of the above tasks are performed. A minimum of 22 points must be attained to earn a prize.

Here's a sample of one of our sessions:

Weekly Objective: SUCCESS!

 $\textbf{Introduction: "Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts." — Winston S.\\$

Churchill

Group Discussion:

- How do you define success?
- What does success mean to you?
- Is there a difference between personal/school/work related-success?
- Compare and contrast the characteristics of successful people and unsuccessful people.

Activity: Winners and Losers

Winners and Losers is best played in groups of four players or more and is designed to help participants develop a respect for differing views and to consider what they respect about others. Each group will select a leader and a recorder.

Then each group will select a person they admire and consider a "winner" in life. The groups will record why this person is successful in their eyes and then decide on at least 5 personality or character traits they admire about their choice.

Repeat the process, but this time have each group choose a person that they do not respect or

consider a "loser" in life. The groups will record why that person is considered not successful or a "loser" in their eyes and decide on at least 5 personality or character traits they dislike about the person.

Someone from each group will share with the class their "winner" and what makes them a "winner" and their "loser" and what makes them a "loser". Encourage the class to comment on whether they agree or disagree that the "winner" in question is admirable and why, and so on with the "loser". The goal of the game is to help participants have success operating as a team, to respect the views of others and to express what characteristics inspire respect within themselves.

- What did you and other people in the class consider successful?

Take-Home Assignment: "Think About It" Journal for 10 mins about what you will do to be successful in the future

1. **Organization's Background:** concise description of the Applicant Agency, including its history, years of operation, general mission statement, and primary services provided.

The FLITE Center (Fort Lauderdale Independence, Training & Education Center), was created in 2009 through a partnership of the Community Foundation of Broward, the United Way of Broward County and the Junior League of Greater Fort Lauderdale, with the intent of increasing access to services for youth aging out of foster care.

The FLITE Center, located in central Broward County, serves as a one-stop resource center for young people (17-23 years old) aging out the foster care system to independent living. It offers a single, convenient point of access to the broad range of services and support systems needed to become successful adults within a safe, nurturing environment that promotes personal growth while developing practical lifestyle skills. The FLITE Center's model is designed to coordinate and provide self-sufficiency, psycho-social and other essential supports to address the unique needs of youth transitioning out of foster care. This program strives to ensure that this fragile population develops essential skills and competencies in education, employment, daily living, decision-making and interpersonal communication; crucial modules to begin building their lives as productive members of the community.

FLITE Center serves youth transitioning out of the foster care system of Broward County with the support of local agencies. Transitional programs and services provided are crucial to their success in the future. The FLITE Center enables this population to have a seamless connection to all of the services available throughout the county in one location. Youth aging out of the foster care system are low-income and at risk of many challenges and barriers to success and independence if unaided by a support network connected by The FLITE Center. Approximately 1000 youth are served per year. On an annual basis, these youth visit FLITE upwards of 10,000 times.

As the first One-Stop Resource Center for the TIL (Transitioning to Independent Living) youth in our State, there has been statewide awareness and recognition of our model and multiple agencies looking to replicate FLITE. The model that FLITE Center has successfully designed has created interest from organizations, municipalities and leaders from across Florida and the country. Recognition for The FLITE Center includes the Broward County Children's Advocacy Award from Legal Aid in 2010, 211 Broward Non-Profit Organization of the Year Innovation in 2012, the 211 Broward Non-Profit Organization of the Year Collective Impact on Youth in 2016, as well as 2016 Regional Impact Award from Leadership Florida.

The pillars of the FLITE Center services are Housing Coordination, Education Coordination, Employment Coordination, and Systems Navigation, which includes data tracking. These Programs provide essential skills needed to live independently.

TIL Housing Program: Our Housing Coordinator works in the community to secure housing units for the youth we serve. Since 2008, the number of housing units dedicated for this population has grown from a handful to about 200 with new relationships being developed on an ongoing basis. Nearly 300 youth are assisted with securing a safe and stable home annually through this program.

TIL Employment Program: Similar to housing, our staff works in the community to identify employers that are willing to employ the youth. Many of the youth have lack of work experience, lower educational levels, and other circumstances that may keep them from being hired otherwise. We act as an intermediary should problems arise and in many cases they are able to work through issues and keep the youth employed. Resume writing, mock interviews, and other job related skills fall in this area. Since February 1, our CareerSource Broward Out of School Youth grant has served over 50 youth. Since August 2016, our Community Foundation "Youth Work" program has served close to 100 youth.

TIL College Boost Program: Education is the number one factor in obtaining and maintaining economic self-sufficiency. In Broward County, only approximately 40% of TIL youth aged 18-23 have obtained a High School Diploma or GED. The College Boost Program provides these vulnerable youth the needed 'boost' to complete their education and move on to post secondary education. No other program currently exist in the community for this population providing this type of intensive support, encouragement, and remediation on a one to one basis specifically focused on educational achievement. In the last 4 years, 83 youth have obtained a GED and 100% of them went on to be enrolled in post-secondary education.



2. Program Summary (1-3 sentences): Provide an overview of program services.

The requested funding will allow The FLITE Center's College Boost Program to provide intensive support focused on the educational improvement for 50 youth who "age out" of foster care system in Broward County. Because so many TIL youth have failed academically at other institutions, our primary objective is to create a nurturing learning environment where the TIL youth feel safe, are able to relate to their peers, have other associated need met and so are more likely to attain their educational goals. Engaging them in their education will allow them to stay involved in positive activities that lead to reduced levels of involvement in criminal or other negative behaviors.

3. How do you feel your proposed project addresses the LETF Criteria as well as the Sheriff's Priority Area?

The FLITE Center's College Boost Program directly addresses both the LETF Category of Safe Neighborhoods and the Sheriff's Priority Area of Diverting youth from the Criminal Justice System by offering the most at-risk youth with the opportunity to achieve academic success by obtaining their GED/high school credentials, linkage to a multitude of post-secondary education options, connection to gainful employment and access to safe housing. All of these services directly lead to our youth becoming self-sufficient which falls within the Safe Neighborhoods category. Youth also have the opportunity to participate in life skills sessions, leadership development activities and civic engagement/ youth advocacy through youth-led seminars and work with positive adult supporters. Because youth are involved in goal focused activities at the FLITE Center, they are immediately diverted from the criminal justice system. They gain confidence, hope and motivation to continue making positive decisions. "The nation could save as much as \$18.5 billion in annual crime costs if the high school male graduation rate increased by only 5 percentage points," a 2013 report from the Alliance for Excellent Education finds. This is a staggering statistic, but one we know is all too true. Investing in our youth now, will not only improve their future, but the future and safety of our community.

4. Why is this program needed (What community problem does it address)? What data suggests that this program should be implemented with this population or in this geographical location?

The need to improve educational achievement for youth aging out of the foster care system in Broward County is indisputable. The Casey Foundation discovered that more than half of youth transitioning out of foster care will not earn a high school diploma. Only 6% of former foster care youth will graduate from college. According to angelfoster.org only 54% of foster care youth will earn a high school diploma, only 2% will earn a Bachelor's degree or higher. This despite the fact that all youth who age out of foster care in Florida are eligible to receive 4-year tuition waiver if they attend a public technical vocational school, community college, or university. Only 38% of TIL youth are enrolled in post-secondary institutions (www.results4browardchildren.org).

TIL youth entering foster care are almost always behind educationally due to years of sporadic attendance and multiple changes in schools. In Broward County, a stunning 59% of the TIL youth at the age of 18-23 do not have a high school diploma (www.results4browardchildren.org). After struggling in school for years, the concept of completing high school while having to support yourself or preparing to take your GED with remediation is daunting. The majority of the youth leave care at age eighteen prior to completing high school in Broward County, approximately 41% of TIL youth age 18-23 have obtained a high school diploma or GED (www.results4browardchildren.org).

Without the support of FLITE Center's College Boost Program, these statistics will continue to be just as daunting and our local crime rates will continue to climb because youth will have no structured pathway to success. If youth feel academic success and viable employment options are not within their grasp, they may turn to criminal activities to survive, believing that they have no other choice. This undoubtedly leads to unsafe neighborhoods throughout our community because these youth have no family support and would otherwise become part of our homeless, uneducated, unemployed and, inevitably, our criminal population.

The FLITE Center proposes to work with 50 of Broward County's most vulnerable youth during the most important time in their life, their transition into adulthood. When you've been a part of the foster care system, you look forward to your 18th birthday with a mixture of excitement and concern. Excitement because on that day you become a legal adult, fully responsible for your own future. Concern for exactly the same reason. Youth aging out of the foster care system are low-income and at risk of many challenges and barriers to achieve success and independence.

Receiving a good education is one of the most important activities that youth can achieve to propel them towards lifelong self sufficiency. Many youth aging out of foster care have struggled with finishing school in a traditional setting. Poor educational outcomes for former foster care youth have been linked to a variety of factors including; maltreatment, multiple school transfers, lack of educational expectations from caregivers, inconsistent social support, as well as, lack of information about educational opportunities i.e. college admission requirements.

College Boost is an innovative program; the only one of its kind in a community that provides intensive support, encouragement, and remediation on a one on one basis. It is specifically designed for the educational achievement of youth in the dependency system.

As they face the harsh reality of having to support themselves, the importance of their education falls by the wayside without the proper guidance and support. Having to compete in the current job market with candidates having much more work experience and higher education achievement, a high school diploma at minimum is a must.

The College Boost Program provides these vulnerable youth the needed 'boost' to complete secondary education and move on to post secondary education. No programs currently exist in the community providing intensive support, encouragement, and remediation on a one to one basis specifically focused on educational achievement.

FLITE Center's College Boost Program ensures that every TIL youth served is provided with the potential to succeed academically and have access to all the necessary educational supports to obtain their high school diploma or GED. Upon entering the program, youth are tested. Then they begin classes at The FLITE Center to receive intensive support, daily instruction, remediation, and one on one tutoring and encouragement. A lot of life skills and a variety of learning experiences are also brought into the classroom. For example we have a community garden out back that the youth regularly take care of and harvest to make healthy treats.

Youth participating in the FLITE Center's College Boost program are age 17 or older, adjudicated dependent due to history of abuse, neglect, or abandonment, reside in Broward County, and have not completed high school or obtained their GED.

We are very proud of our program results. In the 4 years we have executed this program, 83 youth have successfully obtained their GED and 100% of them were enrolled into post secondary education. Without the assistance of the College Boost program, these youth would not have had the attention and personalized assistance to be able to successfully pass the GED exam and move on to post-secondary education. Every year a special graduation is held for

all kids matriculating to the next level of their education starting with transitioning from middle school to high school. Proudly, we have had participants walk the stage for not just GED attainment, but vocational-technical graduation and for Associate of Arts degrees, Bachelor degrees, and even Master's degrees.

BUDGET NARRATIVE (Required for ALL applications)(Provide an explanation of what the budget will include)

The FLITE Center is requesting \$10,000 to serve 50 youth through our College Boost Program designed to offer GED classes, GED one on one tutoring and post-secondary education options to youth transitioning out of the foster care system as young adults.

Our request includes 10% of the salary and benefits for the Educational Coordinator who provides direct services to youth and oversees the GED instruction of the youth on a daily basis. She coordinates one on one tutoring services for youth who need additional help and tracks the attendance and participation of the youth on a daily/weekly basis. She administers the assessment at intake and throughout the program to track youth progress and readiness to take the GED exam. These services connect youth with the opportunity to reach academic success, complete their GED (high school diploma equivalent), obtain gainful employment and be diverted from negative, criminal behavior.

The GED computer software to pre-test youth and allow them to practice taking the GED subject areas helps youth feel familiar and confident in their test-taking ability, which increases their willingness to excel. We have request 25% of the cost to support this effort.

Each day, College Boost participants come in hungry and distracted. Providing breakfast and lunch/snack items allows youth to focus and feel nurtured as they work on making educational gains. We have requested 25% of the cost to support this effort.

We have requested \$300 toward printing to provide study material/packets to youth in class and those receiving post-secondary education material.

At times, youth need encouragement and their accomplishments to be celebrated. We have requested \$25 per youth to provide incentives for reaching milestones.

Youth who obtain their GED and choose post-secondary technical certification programs often need materials that are not covered by their tuition waivers. We have requested a total of \$750 to support items they may need that may otherwise prevent them from pursuing these types of post-secondary options.

Youth in the program also learn through projects based learning opportunities and activities including hands on work in our community garden. We have requested a total of \$250 for two projects that will help youth apply the material they have learned in class and enhance their engagement and academic growth.
