2	A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY
3	COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, URGING THE MIAMI SEAQUARIUM TO RETIRE LOLITA,
4	THE ENDANGERED ORCA WHALE, AND RELOCATE HER TO A SANCTUARY THAT WILL REINTRODUCE LOLITA TO
5	HER NATURAL HABITAT IN THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST; DIRECTING THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR TO
6	TRANSMIT A COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE MIAMI SEAQUARIUM, OWNED AND OPERATED BY PARQUES
7	REUNIDOS SERVICIOS CENTRALES S.A., AND TO THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF MIAMI BEACH, FLORIDA; AND
8	PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

10	WHEREAS, orca whales have been classified as endangered under the
11	Endangered Species Act; and
12	WHEREAS, orca whales are notable for their high intelligence, sentience, and
13	complex social and emotional bonds and societies; and
14	WHEREAS, the orca whale "Lolita" was captured from Penn Cove, Puget Sound,
15	Washington, on August 8, 1970, and sold to the Miami Seaquarium (now owned by
16	Parques Reunidos Servicios Centrales S.A.) for \$20,000; and
17	WHEREAS, Lolita is now 22-feet long and approximately 7,000 pounds and has
18	lived for over four decades in an enclosure measuring only 80-feet by 35-feet with a depth
19	of only 20-feet; and
20	WHEREAS, a 2017 audit of Lolita's enclosure by the Office of the Inspector
21	General of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) found that Lolita's
22	enclosure fails to comply with the space requirements defined by the agency's Animal
23	Welfare Act regulations; and

WHEREAS, the USDA 2017 audit found that the design of Lolita's enclosure denies her sufficient space for adequate freedom of movement; and WHEREAS, a comprehensive transport, rehabilitation, and retirement plan has

WHEREAS, a comprehensive transport, rehabilitation, and retirement plan has been developed by Ken Balcomb of the Center for Whale Research and Howard Garrett of the Orca Network, to bring Lolita safely to Eastsound, Orcas Island, in Washington state for rehabilitation and reintroduction into her natural habitat; and

WHEREAS, the future health, safety, and welfare of the endangered orca whale, Lolita, are matters of great concern to all who care about endangered species and their humane treatment, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. That the Board of County Commissioners hereby urges Parques Reunidos Servicios Centrales S.A. to retire the endangered orca whale, Lolita, to relocate her from a small tank in the Miami Seaquarium to the Pacific Northwest, and to reintroduce her to her natural habitat as soon as possible.

Section 2. The County Administrator is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the Miami Seaquarium, owned and operated by Parques Reunidos Servicios Centrales S.A., and to the Mayor of the City of Miami Beach, Florida.
