ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY. FLORIDA. RELATING TO THE PROHIBITION OF CONVERSION THERAPY ON MINORS: CREATING ARTICLE IX. OF CHAPTER **ENTITLED** "PROHIBITION 16½ CONVERSION THERAPY ON MINORS" **CREATING** SECTIONS 161/2-166 THROUGH 161/2-169 OF BROWARD COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES ("CODE PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT PENALTIES AND 81/2-16 AMENDING PROVIDE SECTION TO PENALTIES: AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY, INCLUSION IN THE CODE, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, for nearly forty years, major professional associations of mental health practitioners and researchers in the United States have recognized that being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or gender nonconforming is not a mental disease, disorder, illness, deficiency, or shortcoming; and

WHEREAS, the American Psychological Association's Task Force on Appropriate Therapeutic Responses to Sexual Orientation ("Task Force") conducted a systematic review of peer-reviewed journal literature on sexual orientation change efforts commonly known as conversion or reparative therapy; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force issued a report in 2009, citing research that sexual orientation change efforts can pose critical health risks to lesbian, gay, and bisexual people, including confusion, depression, guilt, helplessness, hopelessness, shame, social withdrawal, suicidality, substance abuse, stress, disappointment, self-blame, decreased self-esteem, increased self-hatred, hostility and blame toward parents,

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feelings of anger and betrayal, loss of friends and potential romantic partners, problems in sexual and emotional intimacy, sexual dysfunction, high-risk sexual behaviors, a feeling of being dehumanized and untrue to self, a loss of faith, and a sense of having wasted time and resources; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force's findings are supported by overwhelming scientific consensus that these practices have no scientific basis, contradict modern scientific understanding of sexual orientation, and put young people at risk of serious harm, including severe depression and suicide; and

WHEREAS, the American Psychological Association in 2009 issued a resolution on Appropriate Affirmative Response to Sexual Orientation Distress and Change Efforts, advising parents, guardians, young people, and their families to avoid sexual orientation change efforts that portray homosexuality as a mental illness or developmental disorder and to seek psychotherapy, social support, and educational services that provide accurate information on sexual orientation and sexuality, increase family and school support, and reduce rejection of sexual minority youth; and

WHEREAS, the American Psychoanalytic Association in June 2012 issued a position statement on conversion therapy efforts, stating that "[a]s with any societal prejudice, bias against individuals based on actual or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression negatively affects mental health, contributing to an enduring sense of stigma and pervasive self-criticism through the internalization of such prejudice" and that "[p]sychoanalytic technique does not encompass purposeful attempts to 'convert,' 'repair,' change or shift an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression," such efforts being inapposite to "fundamental principles of

psychoanalytic treatment and often result in substantial psychological pain by reinforcing damaging internalized attitudes"; and

WHEREAS, the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry in 2012 published an article in its journal stating that clinicians should be aware that there is "no evidence that sexual orientation can be altered through therapy and that attempts to do so may be harmful"; that there is "no medically valid basis for attempting to prevent homosexuality, which is not an illness"; and that such efforts may encourage family rejection and undermine self-esteem, connectedness, and caring, important protective factors against suicidal ideation and attempts; and that, for similar reasons cumulatively stated above, carrying the risk of significant harm, sexual orientation change efforts are contraindicated; and

WHEREAS, the Pan American Health Organization, a regional office of the World Health Organization, stated in 2012: "These supposed conversion therapies constitute a violation of the ethical principles of health care and violate human rights that are protected by international and regional agreements." The organization also noted that conversion therapies "lack medical justification and represent a serious threat to the health and well-being of affected people"; and

WHEREAS, a 2015 report of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, a division of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, "Ending Conversion Therapy: Supporting and Affirming LGBTQ Youth," found that based on scientific literature, conversion therapy to change an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression is a practice not supported by credible evidence, is disavowed by behavioral health experts and associations, and perpetuates outdated views of gender roles and identities and negative stereotypes. The report further stated

that such therapy may put young people at risk of serious harm, and that same-gender sexual orientation (including identity, behavior, and attraction) is part of the normal spectrum of human diversity and does not constitute a mental disorder; and

WHEREAS, in a 2015 position paper, the American College of Physicians opposed the use of "conversion," "reorientation," or "reparative" therapy for the treatment of LGBT persons, stating that "[a]vailable research does not support the use of reparative therapy as an effective method in the treatment of LGBT persons. The position paper further states that evidence shows that the practice may actually cause emotional or physical harm to LGBT individuals, particularly adolescents or young persons"; and

WHEREAS, one study found that lesbian, gay, and bisexual young adults that have higher levels of family rejection based on their sexual orientation during adolescence were 8.4 times more likely to report having attempted suicide, 5.9 times more likely to report high levels of depression, 3.4 times more likely to use illegal drugs, and 3.4 times more likely to report having engaged in unprotected sexual intercourse compared with peers from families that reported no or low levels of family rejection; and

WHEREAS, Broward County finds that the overwhelming research demonstrating that sexual orientation and gender identity change efforts poses critical health risks to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, or gender-questioning persons, and that being lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, or gender-questioning is not a mental disease, mental disorder, mental illness, deficiency, or shortcoming; and

WHEREAS, numerous jurisdictions in Florida and across the United States have enacted legislation prohibiting conversion therapy on minors, including, but not limited to, the cities of Wilton Manors, Oakland Park, Miami Beach, Miami, North Bay Village,

El Portal, Boca Raton, Boynton Beach, Delray Beach, West Palm Beach, and Key West, and the states of California, Connecticut, Illinois, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, and Vermont; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance does not prohibit licensed mental health professionals from engaging in religious counseling with minors if the licensed mental health professionals are acting in their pastoral or religious capacity as members of the clergy or as religious counselors and do not hold themselves out as operating pursuant to their professional licenses when acting in their pastoral or religious capacity; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance is not intended to prevent mental health professionals from engaging in expressive speech, such as speaking to the public about sexual orientation change efforts, expressing their views to patients, recommending sexual orientation change efforts to patients, or engaging in conversion therapy with any person who is 18 years of age or older; and

WHEREAS, Broward County has a compelling interest in protecting the physical and psychological well-being of minors, including, but not limited to, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, and gender-questioning youth, and in protecting its minors against exposure to serious harms caused by sexual orientation and gender identity change efforts; and

WHEREAS, Broward County desires to prohibit the practice of sexual orientation or gender identity change efforts on minors, including conversion therapy, also known as reparative therapy, by licensed mental health professionals only, which have been demonstrated to be harmful to the physical and psychological well-being of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, and gender-questioning persons,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. Chapter 16½ of the Broward County Code of Ordinances, entitled "Human Rights," is hereby amended to create the following article and sections:

[Underlining omitted]

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Article IX. Prohibition of conversion therapy on minors.

Sec. 16½-166. Intent.

The foregoing "Whereas" clauses are adopted by reference and incorporated as if fully set forth in this Section. It is the intent of this Ordinance to protect the physical and psychological well-being of minors, including, but not limited to, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, and gender-questioning youth, from exposure to the serious harms and risks caused by conversion therapy or reparative therapy.

Sec. 161/2-167. Definitions.

- (a) Conversion therapy or reparative therapy means, interchangeably, any counseling, practice, or treatment that seeks to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity, including, but not limited to, efforts to change behaviors, gender identity, or gender expression, or to eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings towards individuals of the same gender or sex. Conversion therapy or reparative therapy does not include:
 - (1) Counseling that provides support to an individual undergoing gender transition:
 - (2) Counseling that provides acceptance, support, or understanding of an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression; or

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- (3) Facilitating an individual's coping, social support, identity exploration, or development, including sexual orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct or unsafe sexual practices, if such counseling does not seek to change sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.
- (b) *Minor* means a person less than 18 years of age.
- (c) *Provider* means a person who is licensed by the state of Florida to provide professional counseling, or who performs counseling as part of his or her professional training under Chapters 456, 458, 459, 490, or 491 of the Florida Statutes, as may be amended, including, but not limited to, medical practitioners, osteopathic practitioners, psychologists, psychiatrists, psychotherapists, social workers, marriage and family therapists, and licensed counselors, excluding Providers acting in their pastoral or religious capacity as members of the clergy or as religious counselors as long as they do not hold themselves out as operating pursuant to any of the aforementioned Florida Statutes when acting in their pastoral or religious capacity.

Sec. 16½-168. Conversion therapy prohibited.

A Provider shall not engage in conversion therapy or reparative therapy with a minor, regardless of whether the Provider receives monetary compensation in exchange for such services.

Sec. 16½-169. Enforcement and civil penalties.

(a) Any Provider who violates this Article shall be required to pay to Broward County a civil penalty of \$250 for the first violation and \$500 for each repeat violation. Each conversion therapy session with a minor shall constitute a separate offense, and

INCLUSION IN CODE. It is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners that the provisions of this 4 Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Broward County Code; and that the 5 6 sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "ordinance" 7 may be changed to "section," "article," or such other appropriate word or phrase in order 8 to accomplish such intentions. 9 Section 5.
